Administering Grace

Shortly after accepting a Conference position, my president sent me on a reconciliation mission. Unsure of what to do, he advised, “Go administer grace.”

What an assignment! But the same mission is assigned to every child of God. No matter how messed up, our work is to bring hope and wholeness - not arguments or judgments, but forgiveness and encouragement.

Don't misunderstand, the commandments are important; they reflect God's character, health laws promote strong bodies, and standards reflect Christian lifestyle. But when people mess up, it's appropriate to administer grace.

Jesus did it all the time and still does. The paralytic was a paralytic because of his lifestyle, yet Jesus administered grace. What sweet words, “your sins are forgiven,” and then, “take up your bed and walk.” No lecture, but grace. He healed the man at the pool of Bethesda without retribution, only cautioned him with “Sin no more, lest a worse thing come upon you.” To the woman caught in adultery He probed, “Where are your accusers?” “Nowhere,” she asserted. Then she heard His astonishing words, “neither do I condemn you, go and sin no more.”

Administering grace does not excuse the wrongdoer. There is accountability, but there must also be hope - more than deserved. Nor is it cheap. The price is heavy - very heavy - and Someone paid it.

Administering grace is a God-thing. Consider Hebrews 4:14-16. Three great facts emerge. We have a great High Priest - His name is Jesus. He understands us perfectly - having battled temptations like we do - only greater yet without yielding. As a result, we can come boldly to the throne of grace.

If that is God's treatment toward us, then as Christ's ambassadors

how do we administer grace?

Perhaps a personal experience can illustrate. As a lad growing up on a farm, what more fun than to throw stones! My dad had one unbendable, inexcusable rule: “never throw stones at people, animals, or buildings.”

One summer day when I was ten, mom, dad, sister and I stopped at the neighbour's place to arrange to borrow a farm implement. I scurried off to find my friend Johnny. We looked for something quick and exciting to do and the barnyard offered the perfect opportunity. The yard, hidden from view yet packed with stones, had a lightning rod on the barn roof that proved an irresistible target. After all, lightning rods are neither people, animals nor buildings!

My first throw proved disastrous. As the stone left my hand, my eye traced its path and instinctively I knew the target was destined. There was the sound of tinkling glass as the insulator shattered.

My dilemma: to tell or not to tell! To tell meant consequences I dreaded. Johnny's advice was tempting; say nothing, no one would know the difference. But my conscience would.

The car horn sounded, and the moment of decision had come. I dragged myself to the car while a battle raged inside. Almost imperceptibly I stammered, “Dad, I have something to tell you.” Every conversation stopped, every head swivelled in my direction, every eye burned through me. What

could a ten year-old boy have to say of such importance? “Dad, I was throwing stones and I broke the glass bulb on the lightening rod.” Silence! Then dad spoke. “Son,” the words stung. How could he call me “son” after this? “Son, I'll take care of it.” And I watched my dad proceed to pay for my disobedience with all his money and promise to bring more.

I deserved a punishment. I deserved to lose whatever money I had. But I knew I could never pay for it. What's amazing though, once paid, dad never mentioned the incident! For me it was over - gone forever!

Years later, before dad passed away, I mentioned it to him, but he had no recollection of it. I tried to unearth mom's memory, but it was blank.

Is God's grace like that? My sins are forgiven, God's atoning sacrifice is applied, and maybe in the new earth even the memory is released. Only the scars in Jesus' hands reminds us there was a price for sin.

Dad, rather than administering punishment, which I deserved, administered grace. Maybe that's what our heavenly Father would have us do too. I'm thankful my president said, “Go administer grace?”

Typhoon Haiyan: Canadian Donors Respond

You've probably seen some of the shocking Typhoon Haiyan footage on TV, heard the number of casualties on the radio, or seen pictures of destroyed villages online. However, it's hard to imagine the reality of a situation without experiencing it for yourself.

When you sink into the comfortable cushions of your clean couch, or sip the savory soup you've warmed in your microwave oven, it is hard to imagine the discomfort, hunger, and thirst that many Filipinos are experiencing even now, weeks after Typhoon Haiyan.

Consider the story of Merlyn Bayo, a mother of five children living in Panay

Municipality in Capiz Province. Three of her children are still in primary school, and the other two work as domestic helpers in Capiz. Her family lives along the coast in Buntun, Panay. Their main source of living is fishing and selling the seafood they catch.

Of the 600 houses in Merlyn's coastal barangay, or village, only the residential home of the Mayor was left standing after Typhoon Haiyan.

When authorities warned the community about the coming dangerous storm, her family evacuated about 3 kms inland to a safer location. Merlyn's friends and neighbors also took shelter, and thankfully, none of them perished in the storm. Their homes were not as fortunate. After extreme winds destroyed their homes, they had nothing to eat and no safe drinking water. Their boats and fishing nets, their means of earning a livelihood, were destroyed. Even the school was not spared—the simple structure folded and twisted in the wind, and all educational materials were lost or ruined.

Merlyn and her friends waited for three anxious days before relief finally arrived. ADRA was the first relief agency on the scene, and distributed food to more than 600 families in Panay. The ADRA food packs arrived just in time: the food that Merlyn had managed to scavenge from the wreckage of her home was almost completely gone. ADRA continues to provide food to these families, and will do so until a more permanent, reliable food supply becomes available.

Today, ADRA Canada continues to help Typhoon Haiyan survivors through a coordinated ADRA Network response. ADRA Canada's generous supporters have sponsored the distribution of nutritional food baskets, water kits, and hygiene kits to 3,560 households, along with educational materials on hygiene and sanitation. Shelter kits have been distributed to 5,450 households without a roof overhead.

Finally, ADRA Canada has also partnered with GlobalMedic, a

Canadian organization with an operations office in the Philippines. GlobalMedic and ADRA Canada have partnered in a relief operation on Cebu and Panay Islands (including Iloilo) that is targeted at providing clean drinking water. They already have a large water purification unit in operation, and are preparing a site for another large water unit. The relief personnel have also loaded food into trucks dispatched to an operational base in Tacloban. Finally, some team members are providing medical care, while others are distributing millions of water purification tablets.

Given the scale of this disaster, relief efforts in the Philippines will be long and costly. Please remember that ADRA Canada donations for Typhoon Haiyan relief qualify for a \$1-to-\$1 match provided by the government of Canada until Dec. 23, 2013.

On behalf of Merlyn, and thousands of other people in her situation in the Philippines, we here at ADRA Canada want to say a huge "thank you" to those who have extended their hands to the victims of Typhoon Haiyan.


Heaven's Language – Are You Learning It?

It was only two weeks ago that Pastor Ken Wiebe, our Conference President and I were walking buddies while attending year end meetings in Oshawa. I would tell my wife about how impressed I was with Pastor Ken's physical condition. I was literally exhausted by the time we had finished because it was tough keeping up with him.

How shocked I was to have Pastor Ken call me last Monday to tell me he was in hospital being checked out for a possible heart attack which was subsequently confirmed. The good news is he is now recovering fine and will be minimizing some of his work responsibilities and physical activities for a while but will be gradually resuming full responsibilities in approximately one month.

Our apparent healthy condition today is no guarantee our status will be the same tomorrow. For those of us en route to the Promised Land, it therefore behooves us to be sure we are walking with Jesus today. Ellen White wrote these sad words about a class of people who were granted many long years of life but miss out on eternity. "Years of probation were granted them that they might form characters for heaven. But they have never trained the mind to love purity, they have never learned the language of heaven." G.C. p 543

My wife and I were driving home from church one Sabbath when her cell phone rang. On the other end our eldest daughter was crying and trying to tell us something. Immediately, I sensed there was a problem and my mind began to speculate what her next words might be as I pulled off on the shoulder of the highway. Finally, she said amidst her violent sobs, "there's been an accident" and I can still hear the fear in my wife's voice as she said "oh no - what happened? Tell me what happened? Is everyone okay?" It seemed like an eternity before she finally said, "Yes, we

are all okay" - referring to her husband, her sister and brother-in-law. Then she proceeded to say, "My little doggie, OZARK, is gone. We think he drowned."

As bad as this news was, I breathed a great sigh of relief and proceeded to comfort our daughter. She then explained to us what happened. Her and her sister along with their husbands were canoeing down the mighty Skeena River in northwest BC when they found themselves caught in the vortex of a whirlpool. Their canoe flipped and all four were thrown into the swirling 15 feet deep waters. Three of them quickly made it to shore while our oldest daughter, now caught in the raging waters, desperately tried to hang onto her little doggie with one arm and swim with the other. After being sucked down into the deep waters, she realized she had to make a difficult decision - let her dog go to try and save herself. Before she could make that decision however, the powerful current sucked the dog out of her arms and immediately she swam ashore to join the rest of the team.

It broke my daughter's heart to explain how she tried to hang on to OZARK, the little dog that she reared from a pup and was almost like a child to her. How then must Jesus feel when we reject His arms ever stretched out to save His drowning children? In the *Great Controversy* between good and evil the stakes

are much higher! We have an enemy, who is constantly - 24/7 - trying to tear us from the loving arms of Jesus and prevent us from ever learning the language of heaven, even after we choose Him as our Saviour. "Satan will constantly present allurements to induce us to break this tie (with Jesus), to choose to separate ourselves from Christ. ... But let us keep our eyes fixed upon Christ and He will preserve us. Looking unto Jesus we are safe." S.C. p 63

I like the way the apostle John described it in John 10:27-29, "My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one will snatch them out of my hand. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all; no one can snatch them out of my Father's hand. I and the Father are one."

This is incredible good news for us amidst the vicissitudes of life! No matter what happens - even death - nothing can separate us from the hands of the most loving Being in the Universe IF you choose to listen to His voice and learn the language of heaven.

Resolving Everyday Conflict

“A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger.” (Proverbs 15:1)

As individuals with different needs, ideas, beliefs, values, and goals, conflict is an unavoidable and complicated phenomenon. While there are numerous definitions and explanations of conflict, I suggest that conflict occurs where there is an absence of peace.

We experience conflict everyday of our lives at all levels of society. Conflict can exist between two or more people, across organizations, and internally within one’s self. Ultimately, conflict is tension between individuals or organizations that share interdependence with each other and who disagree on an issue that threatens their belief system, goals, or values in some way.

Perception is an important aspect of conflict that becomes the root of tension in most cases. In the book, *Working Through Conflict*, Folger, Poole, and Stutman (1997) argue that individuals in conflict “perceive that they have incompatible goals or interests” (p. 4). A lot of the time people’s perceptions are inaccurate or misinformed and conflict could be avoided through better communication and greater understanding of the issue, individual, or circumstance. In the book, *Mediating Dangerously: The Frontiers of Conflict Resolution*, Cloke (2001) makes an important statement regarding perceptions and conflict management: “Our conflicts begin and end with us . . . they have little to do with our opponents” (pp. 8-9). Our perceptions and attitudes toward other people and ourselves are responsible for most conflict we experience.

Solomon, in the book of *Proverbs*, has a lot to say about conflict that can help us deal with and reduce the conflict in our personal and professional lives. In *Proverbs 20:3* Solomon says, “It is to a man’s honor to avoid strife, but every fool is quick to quarrel.” Notice, it doesn’t say you should ignore strife; it says you should avoid it. If there is friction in a relationship, you have to deal with it. Ignoring it will not make the problem



go away. You have to work to resolve it. However, you’re much better off if you can avoid the conflict altogether before it becomes a problem. I want to suggest three ways from the book of *Proverbs* that will help you handle conflict. Some of these ideas will help you avoid conflict, others will help you resolve it. Either way, it will reduce the amount of stress in your life and maximize your relationships.

1. Delay your reaction. *Proverbs 14:29* says, “A patient man has great understanding, but a quick-tempered man displays folly.” A delayed reaction will give you time to evaluate the situation, and help you determine if it really is worth discussing. Maybe after thinking it over you will realize that you over-reacted. Maybe you’ll discover you didn’t have all the facts. Maybe you’ll discover that things weren’t what they seemed to be.

2. Say it gently firmly. When you’re in conflict with another person, you don’t have to put heat on your words in order to have impact. We need to keep in mind what Solomon said in *Proverbs 29:11*, “A fool gives full vent to his anger but a wise man keeps himself under control.” If you’re having conflict with someone, say what you need to say. Make an effort to say it gently - you don’t have to be mean about it. And make an effort to say it firmly without threats or ultimatums, simply tell the other person

your perspective on the problem - *Proverbs 15:1*, “A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger.”

3. Strive for a solution. If you want to resolve the conflict in your life, you have to be willing to stop dwelling on the problem, and begin focusing on a solution. Solomon said in *Proverbs 15:18*, “A hot tempered man stirs up dissension, but a patient man calms a quarrel.” Strive for a solution to conflict. You don’t have to keep reminding the other person what they did wrong. Once they have taken steps to make peace, you have to be willing to let it go.

There they are, from the book of *Proverbs* and still relevant for today, three ways to help you resolve everyday conflict.

Going to church as a child was rancorous for me. Not because I hated it, or because mother forced me to go, or even that I didn't want to accept Jesus, but because of the ridicule I received from my father

when I got home. I longed for dad's acceptance and approval but his reaction wounded me so deeply I withdraw from church and religion. I developed a self-protective indifference to Jesus' love; distancing myself from the source of the pain between my father and me. I was distraught if caught attending church, thinking most people

would react like him. Since my parents held opposing views on religious issues, our home was in continual turmoil which fostered in me a distaste for Christianity and a rebellious spirit towards a God who was aloof and uncaring. I challenged the effectiveness of God's involvement with the human race, resisted His plan for me and

chose instead the path of the agnostic.

As an adult I buried myself in the busyness of everyday life. I was a husband, a father and an employee and allowed these responsibilities to consume all my time. I knew I was really trying to distance myself from God so that I could silence the constant promptings of the Holy Spirit. I became irritated and enraged, argued philosophically and defied anyone to a debate when challenged to commit my life to the Lord. Inside, I knew these were only diversionary tactics to derail the real issues but my Lord patiently continued to work on my heart. The miracles of the births of my sons, the love of a woman who valued me despite my short-comings and the prayers of my mother and loved ones began to work on my disillusioned soul.

After my parent's divorce, I haughtily challenged my mother's faith one day with, "Look at all the trials you suffer. You serve your God so faithfully. Where is He in all this?"

As I left her apartment and attempted to get my family into the car, my toddler, who had the exasperating habit of running off, got away from me. Around the car and out onto the street, he darted, right into the path of an oncoming vehicle. The brakes locked, the car skidded, struck him and knocked him down. But thanks

to the Lord’s intervention, my son was pushed forward by the locked front wheels and not crushed by rolling tires! Here was the Lord’s answer to my cynical question, Where is God?”

Despite this miracle, it took many years of the Holy Spirit’s gentle wooing, along with countless prayers, to bring the truth of my internal conflict to a head.

to help. I am ashamed of my ugliness and how I spat at those around me!

God is patient and has perfect timing. I desperately longed for something that would provide value and meaning to life! This yearning was the tender prompting of the Father calling this prodigal son back to the “fold.” About this time I received several DVD’s and as I listened to the messages, God

began to open my mind and heart.

God was answering prayer and He began to change my life. Then He provided a friend to guide me.

My friend asked if I wanted to receive Jesus Christ into


Every day I experience and enjoy Jesus Christ as my wonderful Saviour, my great Shepherd and my all Sufficiency.


Sabbath School Convention 2013

Challenges of a Deaf Child

Our middle daughter, Judy, had a high fever with chicken pox at the age of three months. My wife began to notice that things were different after this sickness. We began to do some simple sound tests and it looked more and more like Judy was deaf. At nine months, a brain scan during a sound test confirmed that she was profoundly deaf.

What is a parent to do? How do you relate to a deaf child? How will they relate to the family? What about their schooling? Questions began to swirl through our heads.

At first, we were told that Judy should be able to learn to lip read and talk. My wife got a special course and tried to work with Judy. We took Judy to a special teacher, but after two or three years, Judy could only clearly say four words. We moved to a town where my

wife could take a specialized course in teaching the Deaf, and Judy officially started Kindergarten. Everyone in the family began to learn sign language.

Later, we adopted a deaf boy to be a companion to our deaf daughter. We tried to start an Adventist school for the Deaf, but it proved too difficult. We then moved to Arkansas and worked with a small Adventist school there.

We learned that deaf children face many obstacles, but can learn and may advance as far as they want to go in school. Perhaps the most difficult challenge is - how will they learn about Jesus and the plan of salvation? There is very few Adventist material for deaf children. An inter-denominational organization, "Silent Blessings" (www.silentblessings.org) now has three seasons of a Christian TV program for children.





Everyone played extremely well resulting in some spectacular games. By the



Shantel Smith



Reports, Goals and Blessings at EXCOM Retreat

The Seventh-day Adventist Church is a complex, intricate and dedicated organization of which you and I are a part. Structures, personal and committees are in place for the governance of the approximately 11,000 members in Canada's sunniest province, Alberta.

EXCOM (Executive Committee) is a committee of 18 members composed of persons representing our Alberta churches. Conference personnel, employees, and laypersons meet together four times throughout the year to direct the work of reaching Alberta and the NWT with the distinctive Christ centred Seventh-day Adventist message of hope and wholeness. EXCOM has adopted five core values reflected in REACH: Revival and transformation, Education for discipleship, Alignment within the church, Community outreach and evangelism, and Healthy leadership and management. With the exception of the President, the Secretary, and the Treasurer, committee members may only serve for two terms or eight years. EXCOM members participate in an annual retreat where business is attended to in a more relaxed setting. This year's retreat happened at Foothills Camp, October 18-20. The worship portions of the weekend were led by Dr. Tennyson Samraj, SDACC President Mark Johnson, Pastor Shantel Smith, and President Ken Wiebe. There was time planned for socializing, outdoor activities, and of course committee work. — *Communications Department*

Round Table on Church Building Solutions a Landmark in North American Division

On September 29, delegates from 20 congregations who are considering building or renovating their own church facility came together at the Alberta Conference's invitation to discuss their challenges and ways to meet them. The day that began with "alumni reunion" appointments for churches who'd attended the Alberta Adventist Fundraising Schools in January brought together 88 participants at the Lacombe Memorial Centre. It was noted by the North American Division representative as an important first in North America.

A guest panel comprised of representatives from Maranatha International, Dr. Lilya Wagner (Director of the NAD's Philanthropic Service for Institutions), Reed Richardi (home churches coordinator of the Potomac Conference), as well as the president, secretary, and treasurer

of the Alberta Conference, were on hand to present fresh perspectives and answer questions. Eric Rajah of A Better World contributed his experience in working with communities of limited funds via a pre-recorded video message. Members of the Executive Committee, elected by the constituency, acted as small group facilitators as well as participants.

"For our congregation," said Blackfalds delegate Andrea Sayler, "Reed Richardi was very useful. He spoke to our situation—a small company struggling with growth and where to go. Questions we'd had for years about how to better reach Blackfalds were addressed. It re-energized us. It was a great community- and church-building experience." As a result, the company that meets in a United church is revising the way it ministers and incorporating house church concepts.

Don Corkum, a former president of the Alberta Conference and delegate at large, closed the general discussion from the floor with this observation: "Sometimes it is hard to have perspective on the importance of a meeting. I have been in denominational work for almost 50 years as a pastor and conference worker. I have been in many discussions on the importance of facilities for churches. This is the first time in my experience that the conference leadership and churches needing facilities have come together to study possibilities and potential resources."

Lilya Wagner, NAD representative, who has more than 25 years of fundraising experience around the world, commended President Ken Wiebe on his visionary initiative, which was also unprecedented in her experience, and which she viewed as extremely useful. — *Lynn McDowell*

Calgary Church Planting Rally a Success

On September 14 over 170 people attended afternoon seminars held at the Calgary Central Seventh-day Adventist Church that focused on how to be more effective expanding God's work. Calgary has 198 communities with an average population of 7200 and to date only 15 have an Adventist church presence. So far in 2013, three new churches/companies

have been organized in the Calgary area: Northwinds Church, Sudanese Company and Cornerstone Community Church. If a goal was set to plant a church for every 25 000 people, then Calgary would need 40 churches. That's 25 more church plants.

There is a work to be done. Praise God that over 40 individuals expressed interest in participating in a new church out-

reach in the City of Calgary. The Alberta Conference has targeted eight towns/cities with a population of 10 000 or more in the hopes of developing an Adventist presence: High River, Okotoks, Chestermere, Cochrane, Cold Lake, Beaumont, Stony Plain and Fort Saskatchewan.





Each year students in Grades 5-9 in Alberta Seventh-day Adventist Schools have the opportunity to spend three days encountering God through varied activities in His amazing creation. Where better than in Alberta? Planned programs are: Outdoor School for Grades 5-6 in May, River Expedition for Grades 7-8 in September, and Outdoor Education for Grade 9 in September. These events take place in three different settings in central Alberta and are directed by one of Alberta's youth leaders, education department staff, teaching staff, parents, and other skilled volunteers.

During the last week of September, the Outdoor Education class from College Heights Christian School went backpacking at Cline River. Even the falling snow did not dampen their excitement as they travelled toward their destination. For the majority of the students, this was their first experience backpacking, so there was a steep learning curve on how to efficiently pack their backpacks, hike up and down

hills, and be prepared to survive in the wilderness. The first day involved a 7 km hike into a large group campsite by the river. While some students were convinced that their 30 pound packs were actually 100 pounds, they all maintained positive attitudes and kept marching along the trail. In the evening, students learned to set up a bear cache, filter water, and chop firewood. The second day included a 10 km hike through snow and washed out trails that had students and teachers clambering over fallen trees and rocks from the heavy spring flooding. The pristine forest scenery was well worth the difficult trek. The third morning thoughts of home, warm showers, and homemade food motivated the students to pack up their wet tents, cook their oatmeal in the chilly mountain air, and load up their packs for the long hike back.

At each NEWSTART station the participants gathered personal information and data, learning how their health is affected by lifestyle choices.

Here's how the stations at the Mannville Health Expo looked:

Nutrition: Information regarding weight and fatty foods was provided.

Exercise: This station consisted of taking the Harvard Step test and heart rate measured.

Water: A bottle of water and water remedy information were provided.

Sunshine: Blood pressure was taken and recorded.

Temperance: Individual body mass index (% of body fat) was calculated.


Air: A Peak Flow Meter test measured the lung capacity against a standard.

Rest: Each one received a short chair massage.

Trust: Participants were given a calculation of their health age from the information gathered at the previous stations. Recommendations were made to each person as to how they could increase life expectancy by making targeted lifestyle changes.

Mathletics is an online e-learning platform where students can interact with other students from all over the world. Students can access a custom pathway through curriculum materials, with explicit teaching sequences built into the support sections. Each student can work at their own pace, over a range of topics, and access structured support when they need it. Mathletics was introduced to Alberta Seventh-day Adventist schools three years ago. It also includes learning activities for Spelling, Reading, and Science. Debbie Nordstrom, Mathletics presenter, refreshed those familiar with the program and enlightened new-comers about the many features of Mathletics.

Two PACeS teachers, Lori MacDonald and Danielle Rochford, attended a “flipped classroom” workshop this past summer. They were given time at this year's convention to share what they had learned. In a “flipped classroom,” students listen to a pre-recorded online video outside of class time (probably at home), where their own teacher instructs a given lesson. The student can repeat the lesson as many times as needed with no pressure or embarrassment. In class, the student then completes an assignment and can access individual help as required for reinforcement. Janet Hall, Associate Education Superintendent for the Alberta Conference, stated that the “flipped classroom” has numerous possibilities and might be especially helpful in a multi-grade scenario.

Teachers returned to meet their students with transformed energy and inspired hearts.




Five Score and Six!

From Poland to England to Quebec on the HHS Montclare, and then by train to Leduc, Alberta. Alberta Komm arrived full of hope and promise in the fall of 1927. Despite the adjustments and hard work (cutting down trees, pulling stumps, cooking for a lumber camp, working as a house maid), she never spoke of disappointment, but strongly maintained that “Leduc was the best place in the world!”

Alberta married Fredrick Goltz on December 13, 1929. They farmed five miles south of Leduc and were blessed with two children: a son, Leo, and a daughter, June. Later the family expanded with five grandchildren and seven great grand-children.

Alberta only received a Grade 3 education in Poland, but advanced far beyond that. She read daily from her German Martin Luther Bible. She learned to speak and read the English language when her children attended school, which in turn allowed her to read the local paper and study her English Sabbath School lesson when her German class was discontinued. Alberta Goltz spoke five languages: Russian, Polish, Ukrainian, German, and English. She valued education for her children. Both Leo and June attended CUC and university and are teachers by profession (now retired).

Modern-day conveniences for Alberta were purchasing a Singer treadle sewing machine that sewed forwards and backwards and a motor driven washing machine. She experienced the evolution of the telephone from the dial party line phone to the corded phone. She flew in an airplane on two occasions, yet never owned a driver's license.

Anna, the only grand-daughter in the family, was often treated to candy and chocolate stowed away in Alberta's bedroom. She maintained that a “little chocolate never made anyone fat!”

A strong faith was a part of who

Alberta was. She (along with her husband) were baptized by Elder Ziprick in a cattle tank in 1931 and spoke frequently of living to see Jesus come. Alberta praised God for her long and blessed 106 years. Six months prior to her death, she walked into the Leduc Seventh-day Adventist Church to her usual pew, carrying a cane that provided more security than stability. Before sitting she always paused, bowed her head, and prayed.

Alberta Goltz died in her sleep on October 9, 2013, in Leduc, Alberta. She was born August 8, 1907, in Kolonica, Kkomunka, Poland and is survived by: son, Leo (Connie) Goltz; daughter, June Jeske; grand-children: Anna-Maria Goltz, Tim (Tina) Jeske, Dan Jeske, Ben (Shaheen) Jeske, Jonathan (Anne) Jeske and seven great-grandchildren.

She was predeceased by her husband Fred; son-in-law, Siegbert Jeske; siblings Adolf Komm, Amalia Kurtz, Juliana Marks, Emilie Komm, Emil Komm, Sam Komm, Henry Komm, and infant siblings Edith and Robert Komm. *Spelling of the Polish family name “Komm” was changed to “Comm” when documents were filed

Onoway Conducts Evangelistic Series





Mamawi Atosketan Students benefit from Employer's Matching Fund & Pay Blessing Forward

A friend of Mamawi Atosketan Native School (MANS) recently doubled his contribution to Alberta's mission school without taking another dollar from his bank account. The kind donor simply submitted an application and copy of his receipt from MANS to his employer's Charity Matching program—another tax-smart way to increase money going to God's cause.

The gift realized by the school is actually 4 times more than the cost to the donor.

The tax credit to the donor returns half of the donation to him, but the employer matches the original gift. The effect is that the gift realized by the school is actually four times more than the cost to the donor.

"That goes a long way for us," said

Gail Wilton, principal of MANS, when she received news of the second and unanticipated donation.

The timing was perfect: the parents, students, and staff of the school were in the midst of a bake sale to benefit the victims of typhoon Haiyan in the Philippines, and the more than \$400 dollars they raised for ADRA's Philippines relief effort would be matched by the Canadian Government, making the MANS impact nearly \$1,000.

"That's a lot of money for our school community to raise," observed Wilton, who credits Charissa Hawes, Grade 2 teacher and elementary vice-principal, as primary organizer and fundraiser—a part of the school's program of regular community service. Parents helped in several aspects of the sale and are proud of what their children accomplished.

Wilton also recognized the opportunity to reinforce the biblical principle of "cast your bread upon the waters, and it will return to you after many days"—a teachable moment created by a savvy and generous donor.


