am so very pleased to report on how our Alberta Conference supports missions. As I write this we have members of the Alberta Conference currently on or just about to embark on mission projects in Belize, Jamaica, Kenya, and New Orleans to name but a few places that immediately come to mind. Not only are Conference members going to these places themselves but the members of this Conference demonstrate their support for missions through their financial giving too. At the end of the 2007 calendar/fiscal year, our membership giving to missions was up by 12.30 percent to a total just over \$528,000. Our membership is to be applauded for their broad outlook in missions support.

The concept of missions often has the exotic appeal of distant and foreign places. It is all too easy to overlook the mission opportunities we have right here at home. But, stop and think about the mission opportunities we have here in Alberta among our First Nations populations. Little, so very little work is being done for them. Creative planning and thought needs to be given towards how we can better share our knowledge of a loving God with these people, and we need your financial support.

Many of our members may not be aware of one of this Conference's programs that is reaching First Nations people. Mamawi Atosketan Native School, located just south of the Hobbema Indian reserve offers Christian education to native children from the Ermineskin, Louis

bands. One hundred and seventy-six (176) students enrolled this academic year in grades one through nine. The principal, Julie Bancarz, supervises eight full-time

teachers, one part-time Cree teacher, two teacher's aides and a book keeper/secretary. One has to visit the school and see it in action to get a real sense of the happiness and vitality on this school campus. At this school these children are receiving a Christian education from caring professional teachers. Yes, you are making this school possible through your support of the Alberta Advance offerings. May you continue your support of its operational





2008 after 55 years and 5 months of service as our treasurer we are saying, THANK YOU, NORM, FOR YOUR DEDICATED SERVICE.

In the early years as treasurer it was not easy for Norman to meet the expenses of the church. Norman found that there were not enough funds in the treasury to pay the bills and to submit to the Alberta Conference their funds. Elder Les Davies was the Conference Treasurer

at the time and when Edmonton's tithes and offerings had not been turned in, Elder Davies would phone Norman to see what had happened. Norman would answer his query with "they will arrive early next week." (He needed the next week's offering to send the conference their funds).

Just shortly after Norman became treasurer, the 2 % Church Family Budget was introduced to the Edmonton congregation as a way to insure that the monies would be available to meet our expenses. The finances of the church did increase, and funds were there to meet our ever expanding needs. With the need for a new church and school looming in the near future, a 4% Church family budget was implemented. God truly has blessed us throughout those years and continues to bless us today.

It was during these early years of Norman as treasurer when it was noted that a new church building would be needed. So the decision was made to build it on the old church school site, but what about our church school? The subject was brought before the church board. It was stated that if the church school was not built first, we would not have a school.

Norman was working for the City of Edmonton and had a good liaison with the Director of City Land Dept. So Norm and the director went to see some available properties and chose the property where our church school is. The church was built and completed in September, 1957, and the church school built and completed that same year.

During these 55+ years of service, Norman has kept the church board informed of it financial situation by His Speaks

supplying to the church board a financial report for each meeting and assisting with yearly budget propos-

als. He also represented the Edmonton SDA Church on many committees (both church and conference).

Norman, although a soft-spoken man, has maintained the trust and love of the church membership. He is a man of integrity, faithfulness, and passion for his work in the church as well as an ever ready support to his family and grandchildren.

For many years Ponoka has unofficially been known as the "Mental Health Capital" of Alberta because of its large psychiatric and brain injury hospital location. Therefore, what a better place to begin a Depression Recovery Program! Thanks to the enthusiasm of Linda Nawalkowski and her team from the Ponoka Church, this much needed ministry is touching an important area to meet the mental health needs of the community.

January 17, 2008, was the opening night. One of the 14 attendees, a health professional from the nearby Hobbema Native Reserve who was so impressed with the presentation, asked if the program could also be run at the Hobbema Family Health Centre the following week. Fourteen more health professionals signed up who, after completing the program, are now taking the Depression Recovery program to their native reserves in other parts of Alberta. An invitation has also been extended to present the Depression Recovery program to 100 or more people at an upcoming native reunion in March 2008. The program seems to be expanding by leaps and bounds.

Each program is accompanied by a dynamic DVD presentation followed by delicious food preparations and samples, discussion, and friendly outreach from the church members. Twenty-eight people so far have signed up to complete the program, and God is blessing this outreach. The times we are living in make this an ideal way to minister to felt needs, win the confidence of the community, and eventually lead them to follow Christ.

Roland Booth 90 Years Young!

day. He grew up working hard on the family farm and was often kept home from school to help with the work on the farm. In spite of the many days missed from school he still did well. He attended the Ryley School from Grades 1 to 8, worked at home for three years, and then went to Oshawa, Ontario where he attended


Oshawa Missionary College (now Kingsway College) for three years. His Aunt Vera had helped him get to Oshawa. Of course, while at college he worked hard on the college farm and other jobs to earn money to pay for the expenses. Even though he only had a Grade 8 education, he took business and bookkeeping at College and did very well. After that he returned home to work on the home farm, until 1943 when he rented the Lee farm.

Roland married Margaret Manderson on July 3, 1943, and they started farming on rented land with a stone boat, an axe, and a borrowed cow. Roland has often said that for the first few years of farming he knew

where every penny had to go to keep things going. After 10 years of farming on the rented land, he bought his own farm and moved the herd of dairy cattle, machinery, and at that time the family of six children to the new farm in 1953.

Roland was a father who taught his nine children the important values of honesty, responsibility, and accountability. There were often other children living in the home and to this day many of those people see Roland as a father figure. Over the years he supported all his nine children through boarding school at CUC and made sure each one of his kids was able to reach the educational goals they desired. Not only his own children but many other young people have benefited from his support. His family continue to value his wisdom which he is willing to give, but not unless asked, and then it is given diplomatically letting one know that the ultimate decision is your own.

When he was only six years old Roland began milking cows before riding horse 3 1/2 miles to school every



Church Hosts 5th CHIP Program

The Sherwood Park Church kicked off its fifth Coronary Health Improvement Project (CHIP) program just in time for National Heart Month. Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death in Canadians and prevention programs such as CHIP are becoming a major focus of public health. There was considerable interest shown in the Sherwood Park CHIP program at the two info sessions held and ten people have enrolled. The program began with a baseline heart screen on February 10, 2008, and continues on with lectures throughout February and the early part of March. Graduation day is March 12, 2008. A team of approximately eight dedicated volunteers led by Veronica Dribnenki oversee all aspects of the program including lecture facilitation, table hosting, and cooking demos. The volunteer team is made up of a core of Sherwood Park and Edmonton area church members but also includes one non-member CHIP alumnus. In addition to the core team, several other Sherwood Park church members lend their support by providing assistance at the heart screen, guest lectures, alumni testimonials, shopping tours, and audiovisual support. Dr. Christine Simpson, a member of Edmonton South Church and an internal medicine specialist, serves as medical advisor to the program.

Inspired by the Edmonton South Church, the Health Ministries Department ran its first CHIP program in 2004 and, based on its great success, continued the program annually. Over the past several years the Sherwood Park CHIP program has graduated approximately 50 people of which at least two-thirds are non-church members. Several of the graduates attend the Edmonton CHIP Alumni Association which holds meetings monthly at the Edmonton South Church. God has richly blessed this health ministry of the Sherwood Park Church and the church continues to make it a priority to meet the health needs of the Sherwood Park community.

The Sherwood Park Church has a very active Health Ministries Department headed by Veronica Dribnenki, a

After tackling the CHIP program, the Health Team has planned a follow-up health weekend with Darlene Blaney, noted Nutritional Consultant and co-author of *The Optimal Diet Cookbook* which is used in the CHIP program. CUC Highlights

CUC Signs Memorandum of Agreement with the Alberta Ministry of Education

On January 30, 2008, a Memorandum of Agreement regarding certification of teachers was signed between Canadian University College and the Ministry of Education in Alberta. The Honourable Ronald Liepert, Minister of Education and Dr. Andrea Luxton, President of the university college, signed the memorandum which allows for graduates of the CUC Bachelor of Education (BEd) degree to qualify for initial teacher certification in

Alberta. The signing took place at Government House in Edmonton, Alberta.

CUC is only the sixth teacher-preparation institution in Alberta to offer a Bachelor of Education degree. They join a prestigious group that includes, among others, the University of Alberta and the University of Calgary.

The new Alberta-based BEd degree, approved in 2004, is expecting its first graduates in April of 2008. These graduates will be eligible for Alberta certification upon successful completion of the program.

On Friday, February 15, 2008, Mary Krysowaty of Lacombe presented Dr. Andrea Luxton, CUC President, with a cheque for \$100,000 dollars. The donation was specifically for the CUC Music Department Piano Project. The newly launched Piano Project is raising money to replace the department's aging pianos.
