Be of Good Cheer

wo anchormen were sitting side by side in presenting the news broadcast on CTV recently, and the news they were reading had its share of cause for alarm. They reported bakeries having to raise the price of baked goods due to highly increased flour prices. The



price of wheat and rice had almost doubled in but a few months. Oil had reached an all time high, well over one hundred dollars a barrel, and was continuing to rise—dramatically pushing up the price of gasoline at the pump. Attacking suicide terrorists seemed unstoppable in Iraq and Afghanistan. Natural disasters had occurred in various parts of the world with great loss of life. One of the anchormen

remarked to the other in a rather "off-the-cuff" manner: "This kind of seems like a time of trials and tribulations." I could not help but think on how profound was his casual statement.

Indeed, rising food prices are pushing common people to the point of starvation. Food riots are taking place. The high cost of gasoline is hurting the poor whose subsistence budgets are already stretched. And, no one knows when and where this rapidly rising cost of commodities will end as increasing populations compete for finite resources. War torn areas around the world coupled with natural disasters remind us that we live in a world of trials and tribulations. When they begin to hit close to home they increase our cause for concern and give us much anxiety. Life as we have known it will not last. But, fear not. Be of good cheer.

These matters of concern should come as no surprise to the Bible-studying Christian. After all, Jesus has warned us: "And ye shall hear of wars and rumours of wars: see that ye be not troubled: for all these things must come to pass, but the end is not yet. For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom: and there shall be famines, and pestilences, and earthquakes, in

divers places. All these are the beginning of sorrows." *Matthew 24:6-8*. We should note that the word "famine" applies not only to food but in its broadest sense means "a great shortage." And, when there is a shortage of wheat, rice, oil, gasoline, and yes, even potable water, we might well use the term "famine." Knowing what Jesus has warned us, we can be prepared, and have peace of mind, for Jesus said to his disciples: "These things I have spoken unto you, that in me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation; but be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." *John 16:33*.

The famine of material things is not to be feared so much as the famine spoken of by the prophet Amos: "Behold the days come, saith the Lord God, that I will send a famine in the land, not a famine of bread, not a thirst for water, but of hearing the words of the Lord." Amos 8:11. This suggests a departure from God wherein we have no communication with Him. We do not have time to speak to Him through our prayers. We do not have time to hear Him through his written Word, the Bible. Many do not have time for church attendance and hearing Him through the spoken word. We are so busy we do not have time for God! Are we caught up in a spiritual famine? Could this be about what Amos warned us?

In the words of Jesus, "be of good cheer," your Conference has chosen to put special emphasis on the Word of God this year, 2008. "His Word Speaks" is our theme this year and will be the focus of the Alberta Conference Foothills Camp Meeting, July 4-12. Plan now to attend and hear the Word of God spoken. Plan now to come apart awhile and have time for His Word. The words of the Lord are available to you. If ever there was a need for a message from our God it is now. Take time to hear it. You can be prepared to face the trials and tribulations coming upon us with peace and good cheer.

It was in 2003 that the first mission group from the Alberta Men's Ministries headed down to Valley of Peace, Belize, to begin helping to make a dream come true. The dream was to build a local high school for the young people of the Valley of Peace. February 2008, the ninth group, comprised of male and female and a mixture of age, abilities, and past mission experience, had one focus

and desire ... to work together to get the foundation laid for the next phase of creating space for Grade 11.

During the two-week period, we worked, laughed, prayed, and played side-by-side. As the plane winged its way home, I asked members of the group to reflect on the past 14 days together and how they were affected by it. Each mission group develops its own flavour and so I would like to share the personal feedback I received from some of them.

David Fehr, from Calgary, had returned

to this project for the third time. What keeps bringing him back? Here's what he has to say ... "The part that caught my attention the first time I went on a Valley of

Peace mission trip in Belize was that one Sabbath, as we were walking to the Seventh-day Adventist Church for our services, I felt a little hand slip into mine. A family of five at the time was also walking to church. My wife Loretta and I have adopted this family and help them out whenever we can or each time I go on a Valley of Peace mission trip."

Roger Adams, from Alberta Beach, was experiencing mission work for the first time. Here's what one of his impressions was: "My most notable memory of the Valley of Peace is that even in the primitive state of the homes (most having dirt floors) children and adults alike almost always look absolutely spotless. They (the high school students) are beautiful in their light coloured pants and white shirts and dresses."

Roger's wife, Jennifer, had been on a previous mission trip, but this one struck her in a special way. As one of the cooks, she remembers "making giant bowls of fresh salsa from vine-ripened tomatoes." A further memory she shared was "getting invited into homes and seeing the wonderful local kitchens. It's amazing what they can do without all the conveniences we're used to! Most of all I will remember the wonderful smiling faces of the people."

Wally Weber, from Calgary, who has had many mission trip experiences, comments: "I am still affected by how basic people's lives can be and yet how content they are. I remember going to visit John Chen, a church member, and his family of 10 children and noticing how content they were to live under a simple thatched roof and cook over a fire."

Joanne Balog, from Stony Plain, has also experienced numerous mission trips, along with her husband Louis. Here's what she had to share: "We enjoyed the company of wonderful local people, especially the precious students and children, special fellowship and bonding of our mission team, seeing the concrete foundations being completed, distributing clothing and needed items to the community, great weather and local fruit, as well as appreciating our Sabbath rests and excursions."

Troy Davis, from Edmonton, a first-timer to mission trips, shared

how impressed he was when the high school boys helped pour the last concrete slab and how they did it without complaining, but rather with great joy! He remembers the wonderful spiritual times together with the local Seventh-day Adventist congregation. Troy also shared his fond memory of our group partaking in a potluck with the Valley of Peace church family on our last Sabbath with them.

I share in his memory of our first Friday evening service that turned into one big song service that lasted the entire worship period! We finally had to quit because

we no longer had voices! When it was over, Mr. Tun, one of the church members, got up and, with tears streaming down his cheeks, gave a most wonderful testimony about the singing. Surely God was in our presence that evening!

Brian Townsend, from Lacombe, and the Alberta's Men's Ministries Director, has had the privilege of leading each group that has gone down to Valley of Peace. It was interesting to read his reflections of his ninth trip. I'd like to share with you his thoughts: "We have never had a bad trip to Belize, but this trip has been one that has had the most man hours lost to injury or illness, and yet we were able to comfortably complete our assignment. Just think what we could have done if all went without a hitch! However, there is something we need to learn from adversity. I believe we were more conscious of our teammates as they struggled with a bug or a bump. Our mission is so much like life. It means so much when we know that God planned it,

called us and blesses us despite us."

Looking back over those two weeks, I see a curious mixture of relationships, simple living, contentment, giving, spirituality, and compassion. Doesn't it make you want to get involved, too?

This year marks a significant milestone in the history of ingathering in eastern Alberta. It was 60 years ago that Alex Tym and his new bride (Elizabeth Samograd) moved to the Veteran-Loyalist area; and sixty years ago this autumn, besides managing a growing farm and a growing family, he began what was to become a lifetime passion of his - Ingathering! Working the territory to the north of his farmstead, including Coronation, Veteran, Consort, Czar, Provost, and area, he has developed a large base of support for the work of ADRA. Although Alex and Betty sold their farm and moved to Lacombe two years ago, so great is Alex's commitment to ADRA and his territory, and so great is his love for humanitarian work,



that he continues to return each autumn for the ADRA Annual Appeal.

When asked what changes he had observed over his 60 years as a solicitor and ambassador for the King of Kings, Alex commented on the gradual move from contacting largely private homes to canvassing mostly businesses. Commenting on the size of a typical donation, Brother Tym says: "In those days a dollar was a really good donation!" He also noted that working with different pastors is different and that we don't do carolling so much anymore.

A very desirable consequence of the long-standing relationship that he has maintained with a large number of individuals and businesses in his territory is the depth of genuine friendship so frequently observed as we move together from donor to donor. It is often the case that Alex and his host just visit, and after a few moments the host will say something like, "So, its that time of year again? or "How much did I give you last year?" Then, out comes the cheque book. Ingathering that way is just too easy!

And yet Alex is a realist. He says: "We need to get a few new donors each year, because some businesses have moved or changed hands, and some donors just can't carry on." And so this year together he and I shared the thrill of watching God work on the heart of a new prospect – the co-owner of a large feed lot. As we explained ADRA to her, and shared some of the experiences of our representatives in disaster relief following Hurricane Katrina, there were tears in her eyes as she wrote out a cheque for \$75.

Together, let us hold up in prayer, both those persons and businesses that continue to support ADRA financially and also those individuals like Alex who volunteer so much of their time and energy in providing that opportunity.

Red Deer

Young and Energetic for the Lord!

It is always exciting to see how young people move from disinterest, through rebellion, and then get that passion for the Lord that is sparkling. This is exactly what happened to Ashleigh Brown from Red Deer. The evolution in her experience was so exciting to watch, and what a sparkling and bubbly influence she became not only in the church but to friends and other young people, yes! even to the older folks. Her life became one of passionate desire to witness to God's goodness and share with others what an amazing God we serve.

Then Ashleigh decided she would like to do a mission stint and that is where she is now—serving as girl's dean, English teacher, and advisor to the girls. Ashleigh had to find her own airfare and support herself for the whole time she is serving at Kimbia Mission Academy in Northern British Guyana, South America. The village of Kimbia is situated in the lush, tropical interior of Guyana on the Berbice River, about halfway down from the coast. Most positions at the school, as well as the operation of the school, is run largely on volunteer manpower and donations. About 90% of the population in Guyana lives along the coast as most of the country is jungle. The area is very remote and there is only one pay telephone in this primitive village which is about the only communication option with the outside world. In order for Ashleigh to send an email she must either make the eighthour trip on a little riverboat to Georgetown, or ask someone else who is going there to send it for her. Ashleigh says: "This is the most difficult thing I have ever done. The devil is constantly working to discourage and distract everyone here . . . and he is fighting over the souls of the kids, I see it so clearly. Yet I am also happy to know God has placed this school as a 'hospital' in the river community of Kimbia."

They have just completed a three-week crusade at the school, in which the students were heavily involved in visitation and Bible studies. Two of the students were baptized.

The school finally got a tractor to cut the grass—after 18 months of cutting the grass with a machete. The school has a big boat, which can transport all of the students so that they can travel down the river and help in other villages. The school tries to grow its own food but the soil is only clay. Nagarith, from Colombia, has undertaken the huge task of making a compost heap so that they can

plant an orchard for the school and have their own fresh fruit. The kitchen is certainly not up to standard, very primitive, so they hope to build a new kitchen soon.

"I love it. There are many kids who come here to learn about God, and they are very open to the Holy Spirit. They love to sing. The girls in my dorm are all very special even though each one has their own challenges. Imagine being responsible for over 20 girls and being their parent, balancing both love and "child rearing" aka discipline. The majority of these kids come from broken homes or really poor families, so they require a lot of love and attention." Ashleigh feels very inadequate when she has to deal with devil possession in the dormitory and praises the Lord for victory through prayer.

This is a life-changing experience, and God is using Ashleigh to bless many young lives in Guyana.





to Mamawi Atosketan Native School as an example of what their other schools could be like. He noted that this was not the case in their other schools. Also, when Pastor Rojas from the North American Division visited Mamawi and other schools in the area in December of 2007, he, too, noted a difference. He observed a much greater degree of positive demeanors in Mamawi students. When he returned to the NAD, he is said to have reported that Mamawi is one of the "best kept secrets" in the denomination. Mamawi must not be kept secret!
