From the President

An Education for Eternity

eventh-day Adventists are known for their support of Christian education. Church schools, academies, colleges and universities are operated by the Seventh-day Adventist Church all around the world. In recognition of Christian education, April 16 has been set aside as Christian Education Sabbath.



What is Christian education? Christian education is Christ centered learning and personal growth. And, it incorporates much more than formal learning in an educational institution operated by a Christian church or Christian organization.

Christian—Christ centered—education begins in the home. That inspired writer, Ellen White, penned these words, "In His wisdom the Lord decreed that the family shall be the greatest of all educational agencies... Look upon the family circle as a

training school, where you are preparing your children for the performance of their duties at home, in society, and in the church." Unfortunately she also had to write, "It is a sad fact, almost universally admitted and deplored, that the home education and training of the youth of today have been neglected." In this busy age in which we live how easy it is to "short change" the Christian education our children are receiving even in the homes of Seventh-day Adventists. It is time to stop and thoughtfully consider how well we are providing a Christ centered education to our children in our homes.

Christian education is a component of Seventh-day Adventist Church activities. The Sabbath School divisions such as the Cradle Roll, Kindergarten, Primary, Juniors, Earliteen, Youth, Young Adult and Adult are all intended to increase individual knowledge of a loving God and Saviour and develop a personal relationship with such a God of love. How vitally important it is for local churches to ensure that their best teaching talent is applied to the training of our children and young people in their respective Sabbath School divisions.

In addition to the home and the church as centers of Christian education, the Seventh-day Adventist Church, as an organization, operates a school system. In the words of the North American Division Working Policy, "The Seventh-day Adventist school system has as its basic evangelistic task the education and redemption of the children and youth of the Church. Its object is to promote the development of character and to direct the youth to a 'knowledge of God, the Creator, and of Christ, the Redeemer, as they are revealed in the sacred word'." The Christian school is positioned to carry on the work of Christ centered education begun in the home and in the local church.

We can consider our children and our youth to be the most valuable assets in Continued on page 2

Holy Hands Carry Light Wherever They Go

I t is an exciting time for the youth in Edmonton Central Seventh-Day Adventist church. About a year ago, a small group of young people formed a sign language choir called Holy Hands under the direction of Raihaan Sheik. Since then, the group has grown from five to twenty-five with more young people wanting to join regularly. Raihaan is excited that his vision of involving youth in a unique ministry is taking shape.

Raihaan first conceived the idea of a sign language choir when he was only 15 and living in Hamilton, Ontario. He attended a Christmas concert where a choir signed to music and began to dream of forming a similar group that could include all the youth in the church. It happened just as he envisioned it but was unable to continue because his family relocated to Edmonton, Alberta. The Central church had very few youth, but were blessed to have two youth-oriented pastors: Tyler Rosengren, a vibrant new youth pastor, and John Wesley, the senior pastor. With their enthusiasm and encouragement, Raihaan formed a new Holy Hands group. They performed for the first time at a special youth day in February 2003, and the response from the audience was very positive.

This unique group not only accepts all ages of youth, from nine to 26, but has succeeded in uniting youth from other Edmonton churches. Raihaan taught himself American Sign Language (ASL) and then proceeded to teach the youth involved in Holy Hands. They sign enthusiastically to a variety of gospel music.


"We are alive and active for Christ. We are not boring." Recently Holy Hands performed a 2 ° hour concert to raise money for a mission trip to South Africa. The group plans to be involved in street ministry in South Africa as well as Canada.

"My main goal is to minister to people in the church and people who don't know anything about Christ. The real challenge is to get my friends from school to come (to a concert) and really like it."

Raihaan saw a need for a ministry teens could be excited about. He feels that adults expect teens between the ages of 13 to 18 to be strong, but there is not much chance to develop spiritual strength in the church because there is often no mission for the youth.

"I have strayed myself because I am still a young person. That is when I just decided I am going to do my own ministry – that is where Holy Hands comes in."

Over the last year, Holy Hands has performed at Alberta Camp Meeting and Canadian University College. The youth

who attended were excited and many wanted to be involved. "Some are even willing to drive up from Lacombe every week just to be a part of Holy Hands."

What gives this 17-year-old high school student his strong desire to serve the Lord and be a leader in youth ministry?

"I owe everything to my mom. I grew up Muslim and Adventist in South Africa."

Raihaan's mother, Naadiya, became a Seventh-day Adventist but had to keep it a secret because they lived with her Muslim in-laws. She took her two boys to church every Sabbath without their knowledge. About five years ago, his father, Mohammad, also desired to become an Adventist but feared for his family's safety if they were baptized amongst Muslim family and friends. To escape religious persecution, the Sheik family moved to Canada and were baptized peacefully in Hamilton, Ontario.

"We had a lot of joy and pain at the same time."

Holy Hands is a product of Raihaan's desire to unite the youth, serve the Lord and show other youth that being a Christian is not boring. It has also given the group an opportunity to study what the Bible has to say about music and develop Biblical guidelines

"I choreograph everything myself to make sure that it follows the guidelines. I make sure what we're doing is Christian-based and Adventist-based. At all times, we are glorifying God. We always start with prayer and devotions."



Brian Ford Trains Local Church Clerks on eAdventist.NET

Brian Ford, a native Albertan, computer programmer and creator of the new software *eAdventist.NET* for the North American Division Membership Ministries, provided hands-on training at the Century [Computer] Lab at Canadian University College in Lacombe on January 30. Thirty individuals made up of local church clerks, assistant church clerks, pastors and conference support staff, attended the seminar.

eAdventist.NET is a secure web-based program that allows local church clerks to do online clerking. This program will enhance the work of the church clerks in keeping accurate records of church membership; members added through baptism, profession of faith, and transfers; members dropped by death, removed or transfer. This online method creates better membership record reconciliation across the North American Division.

For the many who could not attend this training seminar, personalized training sessions continue by Joyce Wasylyshen, Administrative Secretary for the Alberta Conference Secretariat, assisted by her NAD *e-Adventist.NET* coaches. Joyce provides support and training one-on-one, by e-mail or by phone to all local church clerks whether or not they are online. The Alberta Conference is considered one of the active conferences in the North American Division in this online membership ministry.

Miracle Playground for Mamawi Atosketan Native School

hristmas is a time for giving, a time for love and a time for miracles. This Christmas 2004 the students and staff at Mamawi Atosketan Native School were overwhelmed to experience the thrill and excitement of seeing a real Christmas miracle happen due to love and generosity of some very special people who were inspired by the Lord.

Oh, the fun climbing, sliding and swinging!

In January of 2003 we moved into our new school building just North of Ponoka, Alberta. It was beautiful and everyone was very thankful for what we had but it was lacking something that all children enjoy— a playground. We had applied for several grants that were rejected. However, there was one last grant on which we placed

all our hopes even though we had to match the amount dollar-for-dollar. After many fervent prayers. God had other plans. We had plan B. God had plan A.

A Miracle of Funds

The summer came and went with still no money and no playground for the near future. Another school year started and soon it would be too late to order a playground for this year. We would have to wait until spring. We faced another school year and nowhere for our students to play. Then it happened! The Lord impressed two dedicated Alberta

couples to donate the money needed for both the playground equipment and the installation. The first miracle donation was for \$50,000 for the equipment followed very shortly by a second miracle donation of \$11,000 for the installation. We had our answer to prayer. Unfortunately we were getting into the fall season and not many companies would guarantee installation due to oncoming winter weather conditions. We were concerned but ordered our playground anyway, once again counting on God's grace to provide the

weather conditions since He had provided the funds. Eight weeks later the playground arrived. It was now November 23! The company we were working with did not want to be out in cold November weather installing the playground even though they thought it would not be a problem when we ordered. We voiced our concerns and requested they do

the installation. While we waited for a final decision we prayed without ceasing. On November 29 the call came. It was brief and to the point. "We'll start installation tomorrow but understand that if the weather gets cold we'll have to stop half way through and continue in the spring. Do you want to take that risk?"

It was a tough call. On

one hand we needed that playground but on the other hand we did not want to have to keep 150 students off an

unfinished playground for 5 months.

My thought process was quick and fleeting. The facts were reviewed. 1. God gave us the money at the last possible minute. 2. God got the equipment here on time. 3. For the month of November the weather, so far, had been nice (maybe not ideal for installing a playground but great for November) and 4. after the company saying "No we won't install it", and now they were saying, "Yes, we will install it BUT...." That was good enough, the decision was made. DO IT! However, we would need a little more faith to get the job done.

The Miracle of Weather

On Tuesday, November 30, the day of installation the temperature was plus 5 degrees. The weather continued in the plus range all week and on the last day of installation it jumped to a whopping plus 10 degrees!! It was now December 3 and the temperature was plus 10... we couldn't believe it!! God was continuing the miracle. The equipment was installed, the cement was poured, and we waited for it to set. The last step would be to spread the gravel.

The week of installation was a complete loss for schoolwork, especially on the south side of the building. The students were out of their seats every couple of minutes to check on the progress and see what was new, what had changed and how many more boxes there were to unload and set up. We couldn't really blame them since the staff was almost as bad. With noses pressed against the windows the students kept a close eye on everything going on and quickly relayed information to teachers and other students. Excitement and energy was so high they could not sit still.

At the end of the week, the installation was complete. Everyone was "flying high!!!" All precautions were taken for the upcoming cold and that night it dropped to minus 24 degrees. The bare hands outdoor equipment installation was done just in time!

However, the upcoming cold was not a good sign for a man to be out in an open caged Bobcat the following week to level the playground gravel. That would not happen as long as the forecast remained what it was- all in the minus double digits, not to mention the wind chill!! Tuesday morning, December 7, dawned cold, very cold, a minus 18 degrees. Not a problem for that day since the gravel was only being dumped. It was Friday that would cause the problems. On Tuesday and Wednesday, 260 tons of gravel were dumped but both days were too cold for the Bobcat driver to be out. Thursday was not much better and surprise, surprise Friday, December 10 turned out to be plus 5! The Bobcat and driver went to work and leveled what he could while 10 junior high students and the principal shoveled and raked to level everything they could. Several other teachers joined as time allowed and by the end of the day, about an hour before the sun set, the playground was completed!! With the sun slowly setting behind the sliding hill the lengthening shadows of playground poles were absolutely stunning.

On Monday morning, December 13, the students made a beeline for the playground. Have you ever seen disturbed ants scatter? That was the scene as the children were released for recess. Every teacher was awed by the benefits of the playground. What a difference it made for supervision. Students were where they were supposed to be, and there was plenty of smiles and laughing and giggling just like a recess is supposed to be. The kids were being just that... kids! It was a very wonderful and rewarding sight for the staff to behold and so with gratitude from the bottom of our hearts, we at Mamawi Atosketan Native School send out a great big THANK YOU to our major donors and to everyone who had a part in making this project a reality. **Praise the Lord!**

Holiday Train Visits Central Alberta

For the sixth year, the Canadian Pacific Railway's Holiday Train took to the rails to raise cash, food and awareness for hunger relief efforts in North America. Several stops were made in Central Alberta on December 14 and 15, 2004. 
