

astor Romulo Daquila and his wife Lilia were born and raised in the Philippines.
They graduated from Philippine Union
College, now known as the Adventist University of the Philippines. Both of them are secondary school teachers.



They served as missionary teachers in Ayer Manis Secondary School in Serian, Sarawak, West Malaysia for six years. This was the place where

they were married and where their first two children were born.

In January, 1976 they accepted a call to serve as pastor-evangelist for the Suriname Mission with headquarters in Paramaribo, Suriname, South America. He then served as Youth and Personal Ministries Director of the Mission and then five years as Secretary-Treasurer.

In 1985 they moved to Central California where they helped establish the Central Valley Filipino-American Seventh-day Adventist Church in Fresno, California and served as pastor for seven years. While in Fresno, Lilia received training and then worked as a Licensed Vocational Nurse.

In December, 1991 they moved to Toronto to answer the call from the Ontario Conference to serve as the senior pastor of the Filipino-Canadian and Bramalea Churches. After serving as a pastor for almost seven years, Romulo was appointed to serve as director of the Personal Ministries and Stewardship Departments of the Ontario Conference. He served in these departments for almost five years before coming here to serve as the Executive Secretary of the Alberta Conference.

For the last five years prior to moving to Alberta, Lilia taught at the Peel Adventist Elementary Seventh-day Adventist School in Mississauga, Ontario.

Their three children are: Cely Joy, the eldest, who lives with her husband, Don Essex, in Maryland. She works at Columbia Union College. Romil Rey is living in Toronto and is a recent graduate of Andrews University. Lily Love, the youngest daughter, is living in Berrien Springs, Michigan, with her husband, Alex Masikat and their son, Calvin.

Romulo (or Romy for short), and his wife Lilia have once again honored their commitment to serve the Lord by going where He wants them to go and do what He wants them to do. They also believe that God has created them so that He can accomplish His purposes through them.

CHIP — A Healthy Way of Life

nother Coronary Health Improvement Project (CHIP) has been completed at the Edmonton South SDA church. There were 45 participants and over 70% came from the community. We also had an equal number of volunteers striving to provide a professional and well organized program. The 16lecture series was held at the church Mon-Thurs evenings, from Sept. 9 -Oct. 3. Also included were two HeartScreens, special features, exercise competitions, food demonstrations and numerous shopping tours. The graduation ceremony was held on Oct 9 and the CHIPPERS prepared food for 120 people who had come to celebrate the amazing results they were able to achieve. Each one committed to become "Healthy by Choice, NOT by Chance!" We now resume our monthly CHIP Alumni program (the 3rd Tuesday of each month). As our Alumni numbers increase with each program, we are building meaningful

long-term relationships with many more people from the community.

The medical results of this life-changing program are phenomenal, and in many cases, they surpass the results from medication use — in only 30 days!! Many of the participants were able to drop their cholesterol levels by close to 30%, which lowers their risk for Heart Disease by up to 90%. Blood pressures fell from the danger zone to a safe level and a number of participants lost 5-10% of their body weight in just four weeks.

But CHIP's ability to minister to the body, mind and soul together is the most satisfying and rewarding effect overall. Participants experience **healing** - not just physical healing, but true, deep healing of the entire person. Our volunteer team, which has also swelled in numbers, includes not only previous CHIP alumni, but many church members who have been searching for a meaningful avenue of ministry. By getting involved with CHIP, "mending broken people" becomes a

reality. And as we continue to work with these precious CHIPPERS, only God knows the true results. As a CHIP team at Edmonton South SDA church, we fervently urge you to consider becoming involved in CHIP; and if there currently is not a CHIP program in your community, get one started!!! Please continue to pray for this important ministry and community outreach.

The Will of the Province

Frances Chant

People who claim they do not need a Last Will and Testament are partially correct. If they chose not to arrange for one, the province has one just for them.

If a person dies intestate (that is to say, without a will), the court will distribute the deceased's property in a certain order provided by law (intestate succession law). The court sets forth, in a very definite way, how the surviving spouse, children or other blood relatives are to inherit the deceased's

The province does not impose its will upon you unless you



give up your right to make your own Last Will and Testament. Also, the province will not remember God's cause if they have to appoint an administrator for your estate. You must have a statement in your will if you wish to make a gift to the church.

"We should regard ourselves as stewards of the Lord's property, and God as the supreme proprietor." Counsels on Stewardship, p. 326

POLICY GOVERNANCE REVIEW

A Report from the Executive Committee

On October 25-27, the Alberta Conference Executive Committee Retreat was held in Canmore. The annual Retreat provides time for spiritual refreshment and prayer, concentrated study, and opportunity for better acquaintance and bonding among committee members. This year's topic of study and discussion was Alberta's model of governance. Guests to the retreat were the three officers of the SDACC (Seventh-day Adventist Church in Canada): Dan Jackson, President; Nilton Amorim, Secretary; and, Gerald Northam, Treasurer. Elder Northam was the chair of the original 1995 Governance Study Committee.

One reason for the discussion of the Policy Governance model was that the June Executive Committee of the SDACC voted <u>not</u> to approve the Pilot Project Proposal of Governance currently being used in Alberta. The SDACC officers explained many of the reasons for this decision. Another reason for the discussion was the frustration expressed by some members of the Alberta Executive Committee as to the effectiveness of Policy Governance. Is it working in Alberta or is there a better way?

After much prayer and careful consideration, the Executive Committee voted to review our current model of governance and to bring it into compliance with the Alberta Conference Bylaws and the North American Division Policies. A subcommittee of EXCOM was appointed to review, study, and research this matter and bring back to the Executive Committee suggested changes not later than April 30, 2003.

Other actions of the October Executive Committee include:

VOTED to accept with deep regret the resignation of Ken Fox as a member of EXCOM and to record a vote of appreciation for his outstanding services. Ken has accepted employment outside of Alberta and will not be available to serve.

VOTED to ask the Conference President to serve as facilitator/chair of the Executive Committee in accordance with the Alberta Constitution and Bylaws and NAD policy.

VOTED to form a Financial Monitoring Committee.

VOTED to withdraw the company status of the Vermilion Company.

VOTED to record a vote of appreciation to the / SDACC officers for their presence, guidance and constant support during the EXCOM Retreat.
