

he University of Alberta in Ed monton hosts yearly approxi mately 30,000 students within its academic boundaries-simulating a "city within a city." It is here on this campus that Seventh-day Adventist young adults have an opportunity to work for Christ that is unmatched anywhere else...and they are accepting the challenge. Campus Advent (CA), our SDA student-run organization on the U of A campus, has been in existence for many, many years, but a new fire has been lit within the organization, and students with the enthusiasm and power of the Holy Spirit are thrilled to set in motion their motto: "To Boldly Go Where He Would Go!"

Under the energetic guidance of their new chaplain, Carolyn Macomber, the executive committee has identified six targets for ministry with plans to build on last year's success to incorporate these goals into their school-year program for 1998/1999:

- 1. Physical: Numerous social events are planned on a weekly basis, including sports tournaments, weekend campouts, winter retreats, etc. CA feels this is a vital element in outreach ministry—reaching people where they are and in their comfort zone.
- Intellectual: Opportunities are provided through weekly meetings, as well as during campus-wide functions and on an individual basis to stimulate the "academically minded."

From the President ... Bearing Fruit

f you know that what you said to your closest friends during the next half hour would be the last words you would speak to them before your death, what would you want to say for them to remember you by? Jesus and His disciples had just completed the "Last Supper" and were on their way to the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus would be arrested and taken to be crucified. John records His last words to the disciples in chapters 14 to 16. He promised them He would send His Holy Spirit to guide and comfort them - that



Spirit that would assure them of His continued existence and presence with them. And then He told them just how close He wanted to be to them: "I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing" (John 15:5 NIV).

What an intimate connection the Lord wants to have with His people! The very life of Jesus flowing through us — for that is exactly what happens to a branch on a grape vine. It is a part of the vine and shares the vine's nutrients, the vine's strength, and the attacks upon the vine as well. The vine and its branches are so inter-connected as to be considered one and the same thing. This is the identity that Jesus is willing to have with His followers!

As people look at the branches and the fruit they produce, they make judgments about the value of the whole plant. To the passerby, the branches are more visible than the vine itself. They are what is seen. And what they see in the branches leads them to their opinion of the value of the entire plant. In a similar way, it is true that people judge Christianity (and a particular brand of Christianity such as denominations) by what they see in its adherents. What a responsibility is ours! And yet what a privilege! We can, by being solidly connected to the Vine, be the means of attracting men and women to Jesus. In fact, Jesus says in this verse that if we remain connected to Him we will bear much fruit. Our lives will produce positive opinions about the Vine. The fruits of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control—Gal.5:22) will be seen in us! And as our lives reveal the fruits of the Spirit, the additional fruit of encouragement and conversion of others will also occur.

When connected to a healthy vine (and what vine is healthier than Jesus!) a branch will inevitably bear fruit. But when a branch is disconnected from the vine it simply will not bear fruit. That fact is so true that it became the basis of a miracle in the days of Moses and Aaron. Some of the people were complaining about Aaron and the tribe of Levi being given the spiritual leadership position among the people. And so the Lord Himself instructed that the leader of each tribe bring a rod and Moses would put them into the sanctuary overnight. The Lord said that in the morning the rod that had blossoms on it would be an indication to know that God Himself had selected that tribe and that man as the spiritual leader in Israel. Miraculously, Aaron's rod not only blossomed but also bore almonds. It was a miracle and the people knew it. By that means they recognized that God had, indeed, chosen Aaron to be the high priest and the tribe of Levi to assist him.

Using this universal truth about branches Jesus warns His disciples that without being connected to Him they simply cannot bear fruit. The fruit is not something a branch produces. It is something that comes by being connected to the Vine. The whole issue of fruit-bearing is in the connections you have.

Over the generations since Jesus left His disciples there has been much agitation about fruit-bearing. Too many times His followers have forgotten the vital truth that Jesus expressed in this parable. Artificial fruit has been forced from lives not truly connected to the Vine. It was that way in Jesus' day and we still struggle with those whose focus is so much upon what they deem to be the fruit of sanctification that they miss the connection with Jesus. But no matter how good it looks, it is still artificial fruit and it has no value if the connection is missing.

The beauty of Jesus' plan is that "if a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit..." It's as simple as that! Remain in Him; the fruit will certainly follow and it will be pure fruit wholly in harmony with His Word and teachings.

he summer of 1998 has been an exciting one for Foothills Camp. The camp enjoyed a 20%+ increase in campers, the completion of Sherwood Forest, and the construction of a High Ropes course. The additional 70 campers gave Foothills "405 camper weeks," the highest number in three years! Each week saw the vast majority (90%+) of these young people respond positively to an invitation to commit their lives to Jesus. The increase in camper attendance has been due to the excellent staff and programming efforts of the past number of years. Many parents in local communities tell their friends, "Foothills Camp is the summer camp to send your child!" That is a legacy we want to build on. Praise God for great staff, and an exciting response by campers.



What's this?

Strawberry Tea — To introduce the women of the church (and their friends) to Women's Ministries and to brainstorm for ideas for programs and events.

- Secret Sisters During the year, each participant receives cards, small gifts, notes of encouragement and, most importantly, the prayers of their "secret sister." Each December there is a Secret Sister event (a tea or baking exchange, etc.) where secret sisters are revealed and new ones are selected.
- Health Forum "A Sampling of Good Health" Four speakers were invited to present different aspects of health (sleep disorders, heart health, nutrition, and wholistic medicine). This was open to the whole congregation (men included), as well as to the community.
- Family Health Dr.Reuben Lorenson of the Gimbel Eye Center was invited to speak regarding family health issues.
- Salad In a Basket A local horticulturist and co-host of a local gardening radio show was invited to present a program on gardening. He had just developed (and has since written a book) a concept called "Salad in a Basket," a new twist on container gardening. He demonstrated this concept and gave a lesson in companion and container gardening. Flyers were distributed to the community inviting them to attend.
- "A God For All Nations"— A skit written by Ruth Lennox, BC Conference Women's Ministries Director, was presented on Women's Ministries Emphasis Sabbath. The skit told stories of four women who were not Israelites, but whose faith demonstrated God's love and acceptance of all peoples.
- Mini Women's Retreat in October, 1997 Kathy Jo Yergen, Alberta Conference Women's Ministries Director, spoke about "Getting Connected...The Power of Prayer." The 50 ladies who attended were nurtured, challenged, and blessed by what they heard.
- Mini Women's Retreat —On October 2-3, 1998, Associate Pastor of Edmonton Central Church, Carolyn Macomber, was the guest speaker with the theme - "Over the Picket Fence -Reaching Out to Your Friends...A Call to Ministry."

None of this could have happened without a committed, hardworking group of women, using the gifts God gave them for the edification of His people.






Red Deer Church Campout A Hit!

"One Sunday morning, three men crawled into the cockpit of a strange-looking spaceship which was strapped to a giant rocket at Cape Kennedy, Florida. As the entire free world watched in fascination, the countdown for Spaceship Columbia began. Never be-



fore had a spaceship taken off from earth, orbited the globe, and returned. It took an awful lot of power to make it happen.

The rocket itself was 184 feet tall. It weighed fourand-one-half million pounds. It carried a half million gallons of fuel. It generated five million pounds of thrust—enough power to push the spaceship to the altitude of 23 miles in two minutes.

"After the initial take-off, Columbia climbed to the altitude of 189 miles and circled the globe at 17,000 miles per hour. Altogether it made 113 orbits in seven days. It was one of the greatest displays of power the world had ever seen." *Power for the Living*.

"He gives power to the weak, and to those who have no might He increases strength...those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength. They shall mount up with wings like eagles."
