Calgary Southside Company

In June 1996, four newly-baptized members and seven members from three churches in Calgary began meeting to form a new company. Elder Dale Kongorski, President of the Alberta Conference, met with the group three months later, in September, to officially organize the Calgary Southside SDA Company, under the direction of Pastors Kelly Schultz and John Adams.

The attendance at worship services varies now from 28-40 people but there is growth on a regular basis. The Bridgeland Church is currently in a series of meetings with Elder Verne Snow, and some of the members being baptized will be joining the Southside Company. In October, the Company celebrated its first anniversary and honored Kelly and Carla Schultz for their efforts in helping them to get organized. Mike Kinch and Leo Tan are providing strong leadership in this newly-formed company.

Gleichen Company

In May 1997, a small group, inspired by Linda Calderbank, began meeting at Gleichen as an outreach to the Siksika Nation, east of Calgary. On November 15, Elder Norman Yergen, Secretary of the Alberta Conference, met with the group at a special service that



organized 15 individuals as members of the Gleichen SDA Company. Elder Yergen's sermon was entitled "There is Hope," and hope in Christ is what this small group wants to spread throughout the communities of Gleichen, Cluny and the Siksika Nation.

At the present time, Don Harris, a native evangelist, is conducting a Prophecy Seminar in this district. This is quite a challenge but the Lord has blessed. To date, there have been

116 individuals attending the seminar and several couples have not missed a single night!

Remember the Gleichen Company in your prayers as they minister to the needs in this native community.



From the President ...

Bucking the Trend

"However, when the Son of Man comes, will He find faith on the earth?" Luke 18:8 NIV.

ecently I was reading the latest issue of Perspective Digest, a publication of the Adventist Theological Society in Berrien Springs, Michigan. An article in this quarterly journal addressed some interesting statistical



George Barna is another American pollster who lives on the west coast. He has pursued the general topic mentioned above and has found that while the general statement above is true, there are subcurrents within those areas that indicate dramatic change is taking place. For instance, while 96% of all Americans today do say they believe in God, the god they believe in differs dramatically from the God of the Bible Americans believed in 50 years ago. Today one-third of Americans who say they believe in God actually worship a "higher consciousness" or an Eastern god or "many gods." Between three and four percent believe that they are God. And the belief in an afterlife is being manifested more and more frequently as belief in reincarnation and other Eastern philosophies.

Incredibly, fully half of those Americans who identify themselves as "born again Christians" do not believe that the Holy Spirit is a literal, living entity but rather suggest that it is simply a symbol of God's presence and power. Likewise Satan is seen as a symbol of wrongdoing in people's lives rather than a literal being. One-third of this group ("born again Christians") do not believe in the physical resurrection of Jesus. Nearly one-third (30%) also believe that when Jesus was on earth He committed sins. And while these surveys focus on our neighbors to the south I believe that we have all observed that attitudes and beliefs tend to drift northward very quickly.

As I read the above information I couldn't help asking myself if we as Seventh-day Adventists have been influenced by the attitudes that surround us. Of course, we'd like to think that we have not. But we are living in the world and we are affected by what we see and hear. And while very few Adventist attitudes may have reached the extremes mentioned above I fear that there is evidence that, even within the church, some among us have begun to question some of the basic tenants of our faith. But should we be surprised? God has been pleased to share with us some insights into the future: "Before the time for [a revival of primitive godliness] shall come, [Satan] will endeavor to prevent it, by introducing a counterfeit. In those churches which he can bring under his deceptive power, he will make it appear that God's special blessing is poured out; there will be manifest what is thought to be great religious interest. Multitudes will exult that God is working marvelously for them, when the work is that of another spirit. Under a religious guise, Satan will seek to extend his influence over the Christian world." Great Controversy, page 484.

To the casual observer North America is still a religious, God-fearing place. But upon closer examination the connection between the believer and his God doesn't seem to be quite right. Could that be said of us too? Do we daily take the time to really know our God, His Word, and His will for our lives? Or do we have "...a form of godliness but deny(ing) its power?" 2 Timothy 3:5 NIV. It doesn't have to be that way. If we will choose Him and invest the time to know Him, He will protect us from the deceptions that are sweeping this world. We are promised that, "Before the final visitation of God's judgments upon the earth, there will be, among the people of the Lord, such a revival of primitive godliness as has not been witnessed since apostolic times." Great Controversy, page 464. May it be that when Jesus returns He will find faith in this world – in your heart and in mine!

January Creek Company

've never seen youth act like this," was a comment from one of the 57 excited participants in the Acts Alive retreat held Thanksgiving weekend at Foothills Camp. What could they possibly mean? Here is



what another participant had to say: "This was the only retreat for youth in which I have been pressured (peer pressured) to become a Christian. Usually the Gospel takes a second place to the secular world. For once, the world took a second place to God. It was great!"



We certainly did have an incredible time. We were blessed with three guests: Roger Record from Washington, DC conducted a seminar on music as well as an evening concert; Brain Randone from Texas taught a workshop on mime ministry and gave a number of special performances; and, Elder Bill Kilgore (a last minute replacement for Ron Whitehead) from Southwestern Adventist University, led us deep into God's Word, and into principles of God-centered leadership.

It was like no other retreat. Another youth expressed, "This weekend meant revival." The youth prayed, sang, had fun, loved, testified, and studied together. It was powerful, wild, moving—all in one. - It is farther from Edmonton to Yellowknife than from Edmonton to Vancouver
- From Yellowknife to Igaluit, Baffin Island is farther than from Yellowknife to Las Vegas. This does not take in everything West and North of Yellowknife.
- There are sixty-five thousand people in all of the Northwest Territories, just less than the population of the city of Red Deer.
- The government of the Northwest Territories is stationed in Yellowknife, but there is no ruling party. Each area elects a representative, and this forms the government.
- Every Sabbath about 35 children and adults meet in a beautiful church that was built by a Maranatha team in the early '70's.
- Bruce and LeRee Proud have recently moved to Yellowknife to be the pastor for the only Seventh-day Adventist Church in the whole Northwest Territories.

On a recent visit, my first to Yellowknife, I was excited at what I found. Our church family is small but alive, with many children. Internet Survival for Teachers

Forty-eight teachers from 13 Adventist schools in the Alberta Conference met at Canadian University College for their annual teacher convention (October 19-21). The convention theme "Internet Survival for Teachers" was timely and appropriate since all Alberta Adventist Schools are now online with Internet (made possible by the Telus World Learning Grant Program).

Dr. Jim Jeffery, Dean, Division of Professional Studies at CUC, was the presenter for this workshop, covering topics that included: Technology—The Future Is Now; How to Make Sense of the World Wide Web; Incorporating the Internet Across the Curriculum-



Making Life Easier; Lesson Plans and Sites Galore; and How to Keep Your Kids Safe on the Internet. Dr. Jeffery demonstrated with video/computer online some typical procedures (such as "downloading:, "unzipping", and "e-mailing") so that "Newbies" could become familiar with receiving and sending information via the Internet.

From this convention, it became evident that the Internet offers a number of tools to assist the Adventist teacher. While some schools may be using out-dated or incorrect textbooks the Internet helps to equalize the education of our students by engaging students interactively, exploring the Web for current events, real examples and the latest data. The resource material packet provided at the convention for each teacher included a plethora of educational sites for teachers to visit and obtain lesson plans, activities, and ideas for their classrooms.

In the words of Michael Newbarth, editor of *Internet World*, "A global network is a terrible thing to waste." Teachers in the Alberta Conference have been introduced to the "electronic paper" and are looking forward to many positive online experiences to benefit both the education of their students and their own professional growth.

CUC Internet Outreach

A cooperative venture between CUC and the Lacombe Public Library has resulted in a project that will demonstrate CUC's "good neighbour" philosophy to the community. Using federal funds for getting small towns on the Internet, CUC provides the location, low-cost Internet server, and coordinates the volunteers who will assist users in the public access site. By partnering, Lacombe was

able to double the number of computers it can offer the public and CUC gained four new computers. Of 40 volunteers who have applied to assist, 16 are PAA/CUC students, and a paid intern, CUC student Andre Zetawer. A ribbon cutting ceremony was held November 5.

Tithe and Offering Report

Below is the tithe and offering report of the Alberta Conference for the first ten months of 1997. As you can see, the tithe income to the Conference is down about four percent over last year. This is due in part to the fact that last year we received a rather large special gift of tithe from one individual. If we eliminate this from our calculations, the tithe giving to the Conference has increased for 1997. We are concerned, however, with the continuing decrease in giving to Alberta Advance.





"Disciples of Quality"

was reading Thoughts From the Mount of Blessing recently and was stopped short at what I read on page 40. The thought progression goes like this. "Humanity has in itself no light. Apart from Christ... we have not a single ray of brightness to shed into the darkness of the world....Christ's followers are to be more than a light in

the midst of men. They are *the* light of the world....The church of Christ, EVERY INDIVIDUAL DISCIPLE OF THE MASTER, is heaven's appointed channel for the revelation of God to men." (Emphasis mine)

Why did that jump off the page at me, you ask? Because I know that many of us believe, sometimes without giving it much thought, that Adventists are the means by which light comes into the world. Now I fully believe that Adventists have a message of light to give to the world that is unique to them, but this says that "every individual disciple" is a means of light to the world.

A disciple is a person with a living, breathing experience with Jesus Christ, that is growing with each day as that person learns and accepts new truth. The person who just yesterday learned that sin is the reason he/she does the things they do and that Jesus Christ is the remedy for sin, and in their own awkward way invite Him to take charge of the chaos they are experiencing, is every bit as much a disciple as the one who is old in years, whose Bible is worn out from study, and whose reputation is that of a powerful preacher who led thousands to the truth of the three angel's message.

Recently seven babies were born to one mother all weighing 2 or 3 pounds. Are they human beings? Is the 250-pound body builder more of a human being than one of these little ones? Of course not. He is stronger, more mature, and able to do more things, but he is not better. The disciple who knows only a little of what Christ wants him to know is still a disciple and the ray of light that he/she has to offer may be just the ray of light that we need. We demonstrate our maturity when we recognize that God's channel of truth may come from the weakest of disciples or maybe from those we don't even consider disciples because they "aren't one of us."
