Leo and Joy Tan first came to the Asian church some time in October, 1988 at the invitation of one of the elders, Roger Rodriguez. They found the church members friendly, and enjoyed studying the Bible, discovering truths they had never known before. Before long, however, Satan began to devise ways to keep them away from church. Their relatives always planned chores for them to do on Saturdays. When they were determined to keep coming to church, their friends and relatives resorted to ridiculing them. But Leo and Joy bore the ridicule and persisted in following the dictates of their conscience. They decided, first of all, to have their then nine-month-old daughter, Laurie Janice, dedicated to the Lord. The dedication took place on November 26, 1988.

Early this year, after studying about baptism, Leo and Joy indicated that they would like to be baptized. A date was set for their baptism. Immediately the opposi-

tion from their families intensified and almost prevented them from going through with their baptism. After prayer and encouragement from their pastor, Andrew Chin, they decided to go ahead as planned. Pastor Rudy James baptized them into the Calgary Asian Seventh-day Adventist Church on February 25, 1989. It was a joyous occasion both for them and the church.

Leo used to travel all over Europe, playing soccer for his native country, the Philippines, before coming to Canada. Joy, who once taught aerobics in the Philippines, is a choreographer of Filipino cultural dances as well as a holder of 2nd dan black belt in karate. Both are presently active in the church. As one of the Sabbath School superintendents, Joy says that God has touched their lives by His Holy Spirit and hopes that their story "will give hope to those who are willing to know God and put Him first above everything else."



From The President...

Dear Friends,

On Saturday evening April 22, as I attended the closing meeting of the Edmonton evangelistic series with Pastor Henry Feyerabend, I was thrilled as I saw people commit their lives to Christ and His church. Similarly, as I visited in Medicine Hat last week, I heard some of the stories of the forty who were baptized at the end of their recent crusade. Stories are coming in from all over the conference - Calgary, Bonnyville, Medicine Hat, Fort McMurray - of victories being won for Christ. These success stories for Christ don't just happen; they are the result of planning. A vibrant, fruitful church program is the result of a lot of prayer, hard work and personal commitment. As one person has stated, "If we fail to plan, we plan to fail."

If we want to involve our youth, win back our former members, make the community aware of the message and mission of our church, we need to take many hours of discussion, planning, and prayer on the conference, local church, and personal level. I pray that every individual and church is taking seriously this responsibility. During the next month in the

regional meetings we will have opportunity to discuss with you dreams and plans for the future as well as evaluate our past year's activities.

There is another aspect of our church program that has me greatly concerned - that is our planning for the support of our church financially. We also have the satisfaction of knowing that we are doing our part to help expand the kingdom of God on planet earth.

Are we so in tune with God as we plan for Him in our giving that we listen to His voice? This will prevent us from spending on the basis of the urgings of a selfish heart.

The Lord wants us to keep in mind the needs of His work as we plan our giving. This is on the local church, local conference and world level. Each member should be aware of the needs of the local congregation and the level of support needed to carry out an aggressive program. As you are aware, the main basis of income, outside of the tithe, to carry out the varied program of the conference is through Alberta Advance. Through this fund we provide funds for evangelism, Christian education, youth camps, periodicals for our members, church and school building projects, campmeeting, etc. The giving guide for each member is 2% of income for Alberta Advance. If this were faithfully realized we would have plenty of funds to carry on an aggressive program on the conference level. Unfortunately we have only received one fourth this amount in past years and this


Approximately 60 ASI members and prospective members gathered at the Pineridge Church in Calgary for a successful weekend rally. An Evaluation Committee was appointed by the Administration of the Alberta Conference and commenced their work on the weekend of March 10-12 in Hobbema. This was the first evaluation since the inception of the native work 8 years ago. Members comprising the committee included:

As a result of the weekend evaluation, some of the recommendations are as follows:

1. Major planning and orientation weekends take place three times a year. These weekends would be used as in-service weekends for teachers, orientation and planning for ministry, and planning sessions for all interested participants in the native ministries.

2. Develop and improve the spiritual programs toward and within the Native cultural context. E.g., Traditional European/Caucasian church programs vs. Native cultural programs.

3. Develop the blending of the educational ministry to children and the spiritual ministry to the

parents of the children in our school.

4. Work towards additional financial assistance and subsidies for the Native Campus Ministries program.

5. Table the Native Ministries Task Force committee until specific plans are established, implemented and evaluated within the Hobbema reserve.

A major planning weekend will be conducted under the leadership of Pastor Monte Church, on the weekend of May 26-28, 1989. An invitation is extended to all who are interested in the Native work in Alberta. Calgary Spanish Grow From 5 To 50

Helmer Ayerdis, his wife, and two children came to Calgary from Nicaragua in 1987. They were the first Adventist family to settle in this city. Mrs. Daisy Pineda had arrived one year earlier with her husband and two sons, but because of being the only Adventist in her family and with the responsibilities of being mother and wife, she had had to worship alone.

With the arrival of the Ayerdis family, there were now five baptized members. They gathered together in the kitchen of the Pineridge Church and Pastor Glen Corkum happily consented to them meeting there each Sabbath.

Brother Ayerdis preached and led out. When he asked for some help, Pastor Ron Teranski was able to preach on two occasions while his wife translated into Spanish. Sometimes Daisy's husband also translated for the group.

Pastor Victor Schulz carefully tended this little flock. He visited with their group and encouraged them to move ahead. He baptized Josefina and Wilma Parrilla, a couple who had been prepared for baptism by Brother Ayerdis. Even though the group had no specified leader, the group was strengthened with the arrival of the Gilberto Gonzalez family. Friends and relatives were invited to worship with this group of Spanish-speaking people, but because there was no pastor leading, they would come once and then not attend again. Pastor Schulz sent material and a projector, and

Brother Ayerdis used these items to continue proclaiming the Gospel in his area.

Pastor Juan Perez and his wife Elena accepted the call to come to Canada and pastor this congregation. As he worked to build up this group, he became acquainted with other Spanish-speaking people in the city and to date, fifty persons are now present for the Sabbath services, thirty four of whom are baptized. Praise God for His leading!

On Sabbath, April 18, Elder Lawton Lowe from the SDA Church in Canada and Elder Don Corkum had the privilege of spending some time with the Calgary Spanish congregation. These men were in Calgary attending the ASI Western Canada Convention, which was also held at Pineridge Church. The group is now meeting in the Sanctuary where it is more comfortable to worship their God and Creator. They hope that the blessings of God will continue and that one day there will be a large membership in a beautiful building in Calgary working and waiting for Jesus to return.

Pastor Perez prays that the Lord will bless the membership of all of the languages in this kind country that has made them so welcome. He prays daily for the administrators of our church. Won't you join him as we pray together for God's Spirit to bring us all into harmony with Him so we can all be ready for His very soon return?



It was a rich and meaningful evening on Friday, March 24, at the Sylvan Lake Church as a group of men depicted the Last Supper under the able direction of Mrs. Eva Werk. The church was in darkness as they took their places. The floodlight showed the group authentically dressed and placed at the table according to the famous painting, "The Last Sup-

Child Evangelism Council

1989 Pilot Project

The Child Evangelism Council of the Alberta Conference has chosen a pilot project that will be implemented in the Alberta Conference that will run for one year. This project will be carefully followed and analyzed and a report will be given at the Child Evangelism Workshop in April of 1990.

DIAL-A-STORY is a unique ministry to children through the use of the telephone. Children can call a local number and listen to a dramatized story played on a telephone answering machine. Each story is approximately 2.5 minutes long with a 30-second tag on the end to advertise and/or invite children to your church programs.

CHILDREN'S CHURCH is a unique outreach ministry using the Neighborhood Bible Story Hour approach, but including additional segments such as skits, sermonettes, and craft times. It has proven to be very successful in reaching many children for Christ.

SIX PROJECT SITES were chosen (subject to Church Board approval) at the 1989 Child Evangelism workshop. The Child Evangelism Council will subsidize fifty percent (50%) of the cost of the two above programs for the six pilot projects for one year.

Incorporation

The Child Evangelism Council has received permission to form a non-profit corporation in Alberta to conduct our child evangelism outreach. The name of the Corporation is "ALBERTA CHILD GUIDANCE ASSOCIATION". This incorporation will become the vehicle for developing a strong summer children's ministry program by employing students during the summer.

Johnsson Holds Informative Seminar

Noelene Johnsson, Children's Ministries Coordinator for the NAD and her assistant, Denise Valenzuela, conducted a lively and informative seminar for representatives from the churches around the conference. "The Quiet Ministry Among Us"

Another parable He (Jesus) spoke to them: The Kingdom of heaven is like heaven, which a woman took and hid three measure of meal till it was all leavened." Matthew 13:33.

This quiet, slow work of leaven well describes the work of true literature evangelists. The printed matter in homes of the people, combined with the positive influence left there works as a leaven quietly, and imperceptibly.

There are four basic categories of literature our L.E.'s are handling. Strong decision books--Spirit of Prophecy Conflict series, Daniel and Revelation, God Cares and others. There are children's books--Bible-Bedtime Stories, My Bible Friends that do effective youth evangelism. Together with You and Your Health series and temperance and health magazines, prejudices are removed, people's minds are opened, and they are helped to make their first faltering steps toward a better life. Finally, there are family-oriented publications that help to improve relationships between spouses, parents and

their children and guide into wholesome relationships.

Every day our L.E.'s find people eager to accept and purchase our literature. Often they meet the less fortunate ones and leave free literature or enroll them in Correspondence Bible School.

It is thrilling to see a young woman grasping the Bible Story book with both of her hands saying: I grew up in a bad situation, my parents were not christians, but I used to read your volume one in my doctor's office. That is why I am a christian today. Can I purchase it? Many say the same about the Bedtime Stories, My Bible Friends or larger decision books. As we see these wonderful people (presently members of varied religious groups) we think of the promise: "Soon thousands of people be converted (to the acceptance of present truth) who will trace their first convictions to the reading of our publications." (Colporteur Ministry).

While we rejoice in seeing God at work through these varied publications we are saddened to see some among our own people to criticize and tear down the very means that

This self-supporting project will be nestled on 22 treed acres overlooking the surrounding countryside and will have a comfortable home-like atmosphere. The NEWSTART program will be utilized. This project will be operated by a dedicated experienced staff and carry on a student medical missionary program. It is the plan that all who are a part of this project, whether staff, student, or guest will be pointed to Jesus Christ, the Master Physician.


-Small bakery: virtually everyone eats bread daily. By providing good healthy bread to the community it is hoped that a friendship will develop, that confidence will be



Uncle Wolf's Nature Corner



Alberta's Bighorns are currently limited to about one hundred small overwintering sites located in the alpine and sub-alpine zones of the Rocky Mountains. About 6,000 Bighorn Sheep now winter in Alberta, but about 1,200 of these move into the national parks, sanctuaries, and wilderness areas during the summer and fall.

Bighorn numbers have ranged from an estimated high of 10,000 in the late 1800's to a low of 1,500 in the early 1950's due to lungworms. Good management has allowed them to increase slowly since then.

The Rocky Mountain Bighorn (ram) weighs around 200 pounds on an average, but some of the bigger ones can reach a formidable 300 pounds. Their coats are coarse and long to protect them

from the unpredictable weather of their alpine homes. The sure-footed Bighorn has hooves that have much straighter edges than those of the deer, and the toes are rounded rather than the traditional heart-shaped pattern of a deer. Alberta Bighorn are not as sure-footed as their cousin, the mountain goat, but they are by far the fastest member of that family.

The Bighorn has two different bedding areas, one for daytime use and the other for night. Daytime beds are informal affairs

that are prepared by scratching a few times on the ground with their forefeet. Nighttime beds are more formal affairs that are dished out

more deeply and are often placed on the lee side of a ridge. Daytime beds are used for rest and a place to chew their cud. Nighttime beds are used for sleep and are used every evening while the animal is ranging in the area.

The Rocky Mountain Bighorn is not a very vocal animal. Most communication



is done between the ewes and lambs in the summertime. The

ram, on the other hand, will snort to warn of impending danger. If angry, it will gnash its teeth, but this is rarely heard by humans.

The Bighorn's diet consists of grass and sedges, but it will also eat buds from various mountain trees and bushes. In winter this animal will paw its way through more than a foot of snow to reach the grasses that it needs to survive. Salt licks are another important staple in the Bighorn's diet. Some will eat decomposed rock as long as it has a high degree of salt content. Watch for them as you hike or backpack this season in our Rocky Mountains.


Grabo - 'Nurse Of The Month'

was delicious, well-prepared, and "beautifully displayed", according to Mrs. McAfee.



Altogether it was a most enjoyable day. We know that Mrs. McAfee will continue to bless and be blessed in the years to come.





WHAT is UCS ?

UCS stands for University of Christian Service.

The University of Christian Service is a method for the systematic training of lay people in our conference. It is a training institute that was established and is being administered by the Lay Bible Ministries Council.

WHERE did it originate ?

In October 1988, the Lay Bible Ministries Institute had a major strategic planning session at Foothills Camp. In this session was prioritized the needs of the lay people in Alberta. From this came: 1) The highest priority is that of systematic training to take place around the conference for the lay people; training that would give lay people certification in areas of ministry. 2) A Steering Committee was appointed to devise a training program. The LBM Steering Committee for the next four months, worked diligently on preparing the concept of the "University of Christian Service", a program of training for Alberta lay people.

On December 10, 1988, the initial program of the "University of Christian Service" was launched.


There are currently almost 70 students enrolled in the Basic Skills in Christian Service program with anticipated graduation early next fall.

One of the greatest needs within our denomination at this time is for trained lay people to carry forward the ministry of the church. The greatest untapped force for Christ in the world is within our own church. The "University of Christian Service" is endeavoring to train in four tracks:
