Wonderful Meeting of SDA Deaf from 6 countries in Sao Paulo, Brazil

Deaf From Six Countries

Dr. Larry Evans [GC] and Debra Brill [NAD] joined with 5 deaf leaders from North America to meet in wonderful 'Deaf Advisory' meetings in Feb/14 in Sao Paulo, Brazil. There were 170 in attendance with one family driving for 3 days to get there from Chile - much of the way on rough roads!

A major purpose of the meetings was sharing what God has been doing in both Brazil and the USA.

About half of those attending were deaf themselves and the other half were interpreters. Esther Doss wrote: "After the meeting, we had such a fun time with the people here sharing about ministries back home and sharing signs. Lots of laughter. Heaven is going to be so awesome when we all meet again."

Doss continued: "the sign language there is called LIBRAS and is very different from ASL. However, we were able to easily pick up some signs. The

interpreters for the event were awesome. One thing we noted is that the majority of the interpreters were male."

It was reported that currently there are 128 locations in Brazil where there are SDA Deaf. To our best knowledge, that is the highest number in any country where SDA's have work! Especially since Dr. Evans began visits to Brazil, the work has grown and a greater cooperation has come between official church leaders and active lay persons!

The deaf groups in Brazil are producing a DVD explaining the Sabbath School lessons. They make special T-Shirts for deaf ministry workers to wear, as you see in the picture on this page.

Years ago Thompson Kay wrote a book on ministry with deaf people. He entitled it: "*Working Together: Hearing and Deaf*". This combining of both Hearing and Deaf is being followed in Brazil. Where there is strong cooperation between church leaders and the deaf community, SDA deaf work is usually prospering!


Over \$10,000 has already been sent from Canada to help build this needy school. It is receiving excellent support from the Conference level!

Training GO Lay Bible Workers in Kenya Workshop

Elder Paul Muasya arranged for our GO Lay Pastor and a Director for Deaf Ministry in Kenya, Henry Kamau, and himself, to conduct a workshop for not only the other 7 lay Bible workers, but several other part time workers as well. They met in Nairobi in the Union Conference meeting center in February. Elder Paul Muasya, the overall Director for deaf work in Kenya writes: “We now have eleven churches in the major cities and towns in Kenya in which more than 700 deaf people are receiving services in sign language. The sign language service is given by the deaf or hearing people trained in sign language most of whom are paid a stipend by Gospel Outreach (an international organization) One is paid by a local conference and others are offering free interpretation service on sabbaths as volunteers. The union is sponsoring five of the deaf ministry in UEAB for theology.”

New Report from Zambia, E.Africa

We have recently received a report from Kim Kakoma, an interpreter and lay worker with the SDA church in Zambia.

Kim has been leaning Zambian sign language himself, as well as teaching courses in beginning signing. He interprets at various church meetings and last year for two deaf at a five week evangelistic series.

Kim has been visiting the Munali Girls School for the Deaf on Sabbaths. He reports that he has found about 12 deaf students with Adventist connections and another 7 from distant churches in different provinces of Zambia.

Kim is chair of a small committee trying to organize Deaf Ministry in his country. Kim needs our prayers and support!

New Technology Meetings Online

Today's technology has allowed unique opportunities in Deaf ministry. Video phones and webcams have opened many doors for fellowship and Bible study. The Z5 Team View Meeting (TVM) is the equivalent to the hearing world's telephone conferencing. Z5 TVM allows up to 12 participants for each meeting.

This technology has been tapped into for Deaf ministry. There are currently two TVM meetings each Friday night. Francisca Trexler hosts one group while Margie English (in Virginia) hosts another group. Participants in these meetings come from all over the United

States, seventeen states so far! These meetings focus on Bible topics that enrich the spiritual life of those who are isolated from each other due to distance. While not the same whatsoever as meeting in person, this does allow Deaf people to not only get "in touch" with each other, but allows them to study deeply in God's Word with others of the same language. Those who have participated have been richly blessed.



SULADS Comprehensive School for the Deaf

Dear God, where shall I send my grandson Stephen?

Clarita P. Inojales is a faithful Seventh-day Adventist member. She had been praying where she can send her deaf grandson to study. There is no SDA school for the Deaf anywhere in Mindanao and even in the Philippines. There is a government school for the Deaf nearby but there are too many students in a classroom to one teacher. She wants quality time for her dear boy.

Although Stephen's parents are not SDAs, she wants him the best education a school can offer especially that he is deaf. She enrolled him in a private school. There was a dormitory and as Stephen stayed there, she would only see her grandson on weekends.

On a weekend one day, Clarita Inojales saw something in Stephen that upset her. She noticed that her dear boy was making a sign of the cross. She asked him why he was doing that. Stephen said that that's what he learned in school. She excused that thought for the meantime thinking that it was only a small thing and she can do an overtime job to teach him not to do that next time whenever he comes home on weekends.

On her visit one Friday in school to fetch him, Stephen was eating lunch. She wondered what he was eating. When she checked he was eating a piece of swine's flesh. To her dismay she stopped him right away - that made her boy upset. She explained that it is not fit for food. But Stephen reasoned that even his teacher was eating that same food, and what's wrong with it?

As she is handicapped also to sign and can hardly communicate with Stephen, She decided to pull him out of school in the middle of the year. Why doesn't our church build a school for the Deaf? She complained. Dear Lord, she prayed. Please help me with my problem.

In church one Sabbath she related her problem about Stephen and how she asked the Lord to help her. It happened that there were MVC (Mountain View College) students present. There's a new SULADS SDA school for the Deaf! The students told her. This seems too good to be true! Lord, thank for answering my prayer, she cried. Where is this? and whom shall I contact? So the MVC students gave her Sir Daryl's number.

For so many tries she wasn't able to reach Sir Daryl because he was out of town. She kept praying and trying. Then at last she was able to connect. Thank you Lord, this is now the answer. Arrangements were made when and where to meet. Then on a Monday they came to the SULADS School for the Deaf in Malaybalay; Stephen, the grandma and the mother.

The Deaf students readily and heartily welcomed their new classmate and member of our school family. After we talked with the Administrator Ma'am Sarah Famisaran, she readily accepted. She called the students to sing to show to the grandma what her boy will learn from this school. As the students sang from their hearts mumbling the words we can't understand and at the same time signing with their hands, she broke to tears. This is an ANSWERED PRAYER! She declared wiping her tears away.

Stephen, who became a friend right away with the students, joined the group in singing and signing. They played and enjoyed their time as



Deaf people usually do in their own culture and language. The grandma was afraid at first that her boy will go with them right back home when they go home in the afternoon. He is very close to his grandma than the mother.

The time came to go and say goodbye. Stephen waved his hands goodbye too as if he had stayed already for long like his new classmates. This surprised the grandma who cannot believe what her boy is doing. He found a family here with you, she said embracing me and Ma'am Sarah goodbye.

SULADS DEAF SCHOOL REPORT

March 26, 2014 - Sarah & Daryl Famisaran

SULADS Comprehensive School for the Deaf opened and started classes last June 2013. Ten were officially enrolled but the three who came from the community nearby just come and go, not on a regular bases and were not able to finish the year. The seven made it.

We had the First Closing exercises in March 20, 2014 to close the school year. Parents and relatives came to this closing ceremony for the Deaf which they will witness for the first time.

Having these children to come to school for the first time, their ages range from nine years old, ten, fourteen, sixteen, nineteen, twenty and they were all in grade one. With their home made local sign language and can never read a letter, learning to them posted a big challenge and much more for the teacher. At the closing program, they recited poems, memory verses, sang songs in signs. They have become fast readers. They have undone their home made signs replaced by the ASL learned in school.

This is history in the making. The first SDA school for the Deaf in Southern Asia Pacific Division.

What a fruitful year it is seeing these seven finished the school year who can sing in church, and can readily read and memorize memory verses in signs from picture rolls.

They have become an inspiration to church members during our visit every Sabbath. They have been challenged that even these deaf can sing aloud with words we can't understand but their hands in sign and praise the Lord in worship. True to the slogan of the school "They shall be taught of God, and they will HEAR and SPEAK of God."

Yes we say a fruitful year because this is a bountiful harvest after a year and more harvest to come for the kingdom because they have started SPEAKING of God in their families.

But a bigger challenge remains for us to go forward in faith to pray more trusting the good Lord to sustain us financially. It is because our students come from poor families who can't afford to pay our required tuition of 1000 pesos [About \$22 US] per month much more for the food budget for their children. Only one student whose mother is abroad can afford to pay. But lately we received word that this mother was laid off from her work from in Kuwait. Because of the local insurgency problem in that Middle East Country.

As this is a ministry it breaks our heart to send these precious children home for the sole reason that they cannot afford to pay. As this is the ministry is financed by faith supported by prayer, please help us pray for heaven's blessings to sustain us. As many more deaf will come and enrol in opening classes in June.

FOUR STUDENTS STAYED FOR THE SUMMER

20 year old, Jeffrey the only child in the family planned to stay and work in our school farm for the summer. He said home is not home to him as his mother is so far away in Kuwait and his father always comes home drunk. The deaf school is now my new home. He signed.

Maribel, 16 was once abused by somebody she would not tell who. She said she wants to stay for summer because she hates home. Later we learned that her younger sister (also deaf) was pregnant and was found out that she was abused by her step father.

The two deaf sisters Rossel 16 and Gillan 10 stayed for summer because they have no more home to go home to. Their parents parted ways.

These four are now busy helping Rami Casas our farm manager preparing, planting, weeding, raising crops for our food needs for the coming school year.

CHURCH VISITS

Sabbath is the most awaited day of the week. Children get excited every Friday because they know that we will be going out to visit a church. The church members who have never heard deaf children sing are moved to tears when our students sing heartily sounding aloud in signs. Many opened their hearts to join hands with us and pledged to help whatever they can for the ministry.

One teacher donated her sewing machine when she learned that we need one for the livelihood projects of our deaf students come opening of classes in June we will start to teach sewing.

A lady dentist and a president of a nursing school donated chairs and tables and other school materials to the deaf school. We invited her to be our guest speaker for the first closing exercises. Seeing the life in the Deaf school campus, the farm and the country living, she pledged to continue her support for the ministry. She encouraged us to venture mushroom culture which she has already, so that she can help in some way.

The Lions Club of Malaybalay City, whose president is a Seventh-day Adventist and an elder of a church we visited, came with the club members and gave school supplies and food for our students.

Many more churches we visited gave whatever they have in

Vegetable seeds, fruit tree seedlings, used clothes, books etc.
